## FEW QUESTIONS TO BE BARRED

Lobby Probers Decide to Admit Nearly All Queries of N. A. M. Counsel.

### CLASHES ARE FREQUENT

Senators Nelson and Cummins Have Tiffs with Senator Reed—Cross-Examination Begins Today.

At an executive session late yesterday afternoon the Overman Lobby Investigating Committee of the Senate decided to admit virtually all of the questions which counsel for the N. A. M. and the American Federation of Labor desire to ask Col. Mulhall on cross-examination. The cross-examination will begin this morning at 10:30 o'clock.

In view of his past performances under the gentle handling of Senator Reed, who conducted his direct examination, it is expected that the committee and counsel will have a merry time cross-questioning Col. Mulhall. The colonel, partly through temperament and largely because of his long siege in the witness chair, is in an extremely uncertain state of mind and nerves.

Senator Nelson of Minnesota is expected to take a prominent part in the cross-examination in an effort to overcome the handicap under which the N. A. M. counsel will labor through the restriction placed upon the cross-examination. As Senator Reed conducted the direct examination, it is expected that he will feel called upon to protect the witness as much as possible, and as Senators Reed and Nelson are never very far from a clash, they are expected to add to the excitement. It is expected that a number of questions in controversy will be submitted to the committee and decided by a strict party vote.

### Wrangling Indulged In.

The committee spent the greater part of the morning session yesterday wrangling over unimportant questions of admissibility and reading into the record letters of no great importance. Senators Nelson and Cummins were in frequent clashes with Senator Reed, and Col. Mulhall was strongly inclined to join the controversy at times. In fact, it took all the severity that Senator Overman could muster at times to keep Col. Mulhall still.

"Be quiet, I tell you. When I say stop talking you stop," yelled Overman at Mulhall on one occasion when the latter disregarded more polite admonitions. Senator Reed placed in the record a number of letters which had been furnished him by Judge Marcker, counsel for the National Association of Manufacturers, of which some had not been written to or by Mulhall, but were between other officers of the National Association of Manufacturers and Senator Cummins suggested that such letters were not competent in Mulhall's direct examination, as he was not present when the letters were written or received.

"You hardly can expect to prove that Kirby was lying to Emery—if I may use that expression—by Mulhall," suggested Senator Cummins. "Well, that depends on the statement," returned Senator Reed.

Retort by Cummins. "I withdraw my suggestion," remarked Senator Cummins tartly. "I have noticed that every suggestion I make is misunderstood."

When counsel for the N. A. M. and the officers of that association laughed at some rally of Senator Nelson over a letter from Bird to another officer of the association, Senator Reed remarked: "Well, of course, Mr. Bird is not our man. Not that I consider the witness our man, either; but I wished to say that because I heard laughter from the gentlemen of the N. A. M. over there." The laughter ceased forthwith.

Senator Nelson started out to question Mulhall about one of his trips to Maine, and asked him if, on returning to Baltimore from that trip, he had not paid off a mortgage on one of his houses. Mulhall denied that he had, and declared, on the contrary, that he had placed another mortgage on one of his properties at that time. Senator Reed objected to this line of questioning, and Senator Nelson finally stopped, with the remark: "Oh, let it go, and don't read us a sermon."

"If I were going to read a sermon, I hardly would select the Senator for a victim," returned Senator Reed, with exaggerated courtesy. "That would depend somewhat on the subject, would it not?" chimed in Senator Cummins, pleasantly, a question which was unanswered.

### AGE DISREGARDED BY CUPID.

C. A. Snow, 69 Years Old, Weds Miss Hubbard, Aged 26.

Not even age has any terrors for Cupid when this little imp once makes up his mind to accomplish his purpose, which is conclusively demonstrated in the marriage late Tuesday afternoon of Chester A. Snow, for nearly forty years a patent attorney of this city, and Miss Adis M. Hubbard. The ceremony took place at the apartment of the latter at the Farragut.

Mr. Snow, who was a widower, is sixty-nine years old, and the age of the bride is given in the marriage license register as thirty-six. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Dr. G. A. Miller, of the Ninth Street Christian Church, and was witnessed only by relatives and close friends of the couple. Mr. and Mrs. Snow have gone on a honeymoon to the Thousand Islands.

**CUBA TO ABROGATE THE IMMUNITY LAW**  
Every Effort Being Made to Have Question Settled Quickly.

According to press dispatches from Cuba, the law which grants immunity from arrest to Senators and Representatives will be amended in a very short time.

In the extra session of Congress, called on account of the tragic death of Gen. Riva, chief of police, and in which Gov. Asbert of Havana is implicated, there were many bills introduced, all aimed to abrogate the so-called immunity law. Gen. Menocal, as well as the other heads of the present administration, have the greatest desire to see that the courts of justice decide this question in the quickest possible way.

The new Secretary of Government, the key to this administration, has been threatened with death by those who oppose the present government, but notwithstanding he is determined to see that the laws be enforced, and his attitude in this matter has been the occasion for many warm congratulations from all parts of the country.

He, jointly with the President, is responsible for the abrogation of certain onerous concessions to the government, among them the law in regard to the dredging and the one with reference to the transfers of credit.
