

GERM RABIES IS CULTIVATED

New York Specialist Announces Discovery of Hydrophobia Bacillus.

UNSOLVED FOR 30 YEARS

Dr. Hideyo Noguchi Makes Report, but Modestly Declines to Comment on "Cure."

New York, Sept. 7.—Physicians today were interested in the announcement that Dr. Hideyo Noguchi, of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, in this city, had succeeded in discovering and cultivating the hitherto unknown germ of rabies.

Dr. Noguchi has successfully held proceedings in pathology at the Army Medical College, University of Pennsylvania, and the Carnegie Institute. In 1908 he was appointed to the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research.

Dr. Noguchi in a recent report of his researches, thus describes the nature of his discovery, but modestly refrains from commenting upon its possible importance or significance in the future treatment of the dreaded disease of hydrophobia.

"In the early part of 1911 I undertook to cultivate the rabie virus, and I have now obtained certain results regarding which a brief report is appended. The results of my researches were made with the brain or medulla, removed aseptically from rabbits, guinea pigs, and dogs infected with 'street virus' (rabies virus) or fixed virus. Usually the animals died within a few days before spontaneous death occurred.

Method Is Described.

The method that has yielded the results to be reported here is that employed successfully for the cultivation of the spirochaete of relapsing fever. In the cultures very minute granular and somewhat conical pleomorphic chromatin bodies arise which on subsequent passages reappear in the new cultures through many generations. The same bodies, so far as appearances are concerned, are obtained from 'street virus' and fixed virus. The granules of these bodies are of the limit of 0.15 microns.

On four different occasions I observed in the cultures from 'passage' and fixed virus nuclear round or oval bodies surrounded with a membrane. These granules, in the cultures very minute granular and somewhat conical pleomorphic chromatin bodies arise which on subsequent passages reappear in the new cultures through many generations. The same bodies, so far as appearances are concerned, are obtained from 'street virus' and fixed virus. The granules of these bodies are of the limit of 0.15 microns.

Bodies Is Produced.

"The general morphological characters of the nuclear bodies are shown magnified 1,100 times in plates I have taken. Nuclear bodies of this size are very difficult to demonstrate either in sections or in films.

"The united individuals in a multiplying mass may be isolated for a time in common capsule. By inoculating cultures containing the pleomorphic, or nuclear bodies, rabies has been reproduced in dogs, rabbits and guinea pigs, as shown by the typical symptoms and positive animal inoculations; while the film preparations from the brains of animals contained always the nuclear bodies in large numbers.

ANTIS SAY "CAUSE" HISSSED PRESIDENT

Opponents Declare Suffragists at New Jersey Meeting Lacked Respect for Office of Chief Executive.

DENIAL ISSUED FROM CAPITAL

Charges that the name of President Wilson was hissed by suffragists at a recent public meeting in New Jersey addressed by Miss Bronson, known in Washington as an anti-suffrage campaigner, were made yesterday in a statement issued from headquarters of the National Association Opposed to Woman Suffrage.

Woman suffragists here said last night that if anybody was hissed it was more apt to have been Miss Bronson than the President.

It is maintained by the anti-suffragists that such conduct by those taking part in the meeting was a violation of the bounds of decency and respect for the office of the President.

A statement issued by the anti in part follows: "The offense occurred the night of September 4, when Miss Bronson addressed the meeting in Spring Lake, N. J., where the suffragists have been for some time. She was denigrating the lack of unanimity in the suffrage ranks as to what man they preferred to carry the banner of suffrage in the White House.

"The suffragist declared that Theodore Roosevelt was the champion wanted by their cause," said Miss Bronson. At this, the suffragists cheered uproariously. "Another," she continued, "told us that Woodrow Wilson was as good as dead as the President's name was mentioned the hissing began, interrupting her remarks.

"When suffragists refuse to respect the high office of the President of the United States, when they hiss his occupant's name, when they show contempt for the very government of the country, it is time to ask whether or not they are worthy to be considered as citizens of this country."

WOMAN COMMITS SUICIDE.

Mrs. Emma Hamma, Brooding Over Ill Health, Takes Carbolic Acid.

Brooding over her continued ill health, Mrs. Emma Hamma, forty-six years old, of 11 Street Southwest, ended her life last night by swallowing the contents of a bottle of carbolic acid.

Shortly after 9 o'clock she was discovered in an unconscious condition by her husband. An ambulance from Emergency Hospital was summoned. She lived until 9:30 o'clock, dying at the hospital. Coroner J. Ramsey Nevitt, after viewing the body and investigating the case, issued a certificate of death by suicide.

GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS FEEL NO APPREHENSION OVER ACOSTA SHOOTING

Administration officials were not disposed last night to regard the shooting of Lieut. F. Acosta, of the Mexican federal army, by United States officials at the international bridge between El Paso and Juarez as an incident which would in itself bring on serious consequences.

The occurrence is regarded as most regrettable, but it is felt that the facts as reported here, show so clearly that Acosta was drunk and had an evil intent in crossing the bridge, that the Mexican government will find it impossible to make any claim against the United States. Brig. Gen. Bliss, commanding the American troops on the Mexican border, transmitted to Maj. Gen. Wood, Chief of Staff, a report of the shooting. On this report, Gen. Wood was of the opinion that the view that there was not the slightest occasion for any uneasiness or apprehension of any disorders as a result of the shooting of Acosta was correct.

Gen. Bliss stated that Acosta was understood to have been drunk, and there is not the slightest question of the fact that the American officials fired on him in self-defense. The State Department has called on its consular representative at Juarez for a report on the incident, and the Treasury Department and Department of Labor are expecting reports from their respective offices on the spot.

It was recalled last night that the shooting of an American immigration officer by federal soldiers in Juarez had provoked no serious disturbance in the border cities, and the Mexican government had in that case promptly acceded to the reasonable demands of the United States. It is expected that the Acosta government will be equally reasonable with regard to the shooting of Acosta.

COLAQUIT SPEECH DEPICTS CONDITIONS ALONG BORDER WHICH HE CLAIMS EXIST

Opponents of President Wilson's Mexican policy have secured the full speech recently made by Gov. O. B. Colquitt at Colorado Springs, Colo., and will use it as a campaign document. They declare it confirms the charges previously made by Senator Penrose that one hundred or more Americans had been murdered in Mexico.

The copy of the Colquitt speech, which the Republicans and anti-administration Senators have secured, quotes the Governor as saying: "With scores of American women outraged and a third of the American citizens murdered; with pillage, blackmail, and ransom existing on every hand in defiance of the American rights of citizenship, the situation in Mexico is beyond endurance."

Senator Penrose has said in the Senate that one hundred Americans have been murdered in Mexico. He would be nearer the truth if he said one thousand.

"His Huerta tells the President to play his next card; what does it mean? It means that he will have to invade Mexico or submit himself and his State Department. He will have to fight or make the job of his State Department and a rag of his nation's honor."

"Secretary Bryan has said that 'Jesus Christ never carried a sword,' and President Wilson has said that he will not allow the Government to carry a sword into war with Mexico. On my honor as a man, I have never been able to get so much as a reply from Washington to my most reasonable requests for information as to the government's policy, and, moreover, I personally know of such instances in which the victims were acquaintances of mine or my personal friends. Texas has 900 miles of border on the Mexican frontier. It was my business to protect Texas citizens from Mexican outrages and I have done so with a firm hand. The difficulty is that I have never been given any satisfaction from the federal government as to its policy. I got satisfaction from President Taft but have received none from President Wilson.

"I do not want to embarrass President Wilson by the handing of the Mexican situation to a farce. Are not our citizens entitled to the protection of the flag? It is all right for me who am safe at home to fold our hands and say peace, peace, when there is no peace; but what of those people, just as good American citizens as we, who have been robbed, murdered, imprisoned, and outraged? Ask them what they think of the honor of the American government? Ask the outside world what it thinks of the honor of American government?"

"I will say one thing—Texas will take care of her own citizens at all hazards, and the United States must take care of its policy. I got satisfaction from President Taft but have received none from President Wilson.

GUNBOAT DISPATCHED ON RUMORS OF REVOLUTION

Douglas, Ariz., Sept. 7.—According to a report received here, another Yaqui uprising is imminent in the State of Sonora, and an American gunboat is being rushed to the mouth of the Yaqui River. Several bands of Yaquis are now said to be on the warpath. On the train arriving at Larido today from the South were 312 American refugees, many of whom applied to Consul Garrett for assistance to reach their homes.

CHURCHMAN SLATED TO SUCCEED POPE DIES

Cardinal Joseph Calasanz Vives y Tuto Passes Away Following Operation.

Rome, Sept. 7.—Cardinal Joseph Calasanz Vives y Tuto, who, at the time of the Pope's severe illness, was considered a probable candidate for the papacy, died today of appendicitis. He was operated on for appendicitis last week and today for peritonitis and hernia. The Cardinal was prefect of the Congregation for Religious Affairs.

Born in 1864, Vives y Tuto was created a Cardinal in 1903. He resided in the monastery at Frascati, a short distance from Rome.

MARKSMEN MAKE PROTEST.

Swedish Sharpshooters Want Targets Re-Examined.

Camp Perry, Ohio, Sept. 7.—The Swedish rifle team which, according to revised statistics was beaten by but one shot in the world championship "free rifle match" won by Switzerland, today demanded a re-examination of its targets, claiming it deserved several more points.

Against this action Capt. Young, of the United States team protested, maintaining that the official score should stand, especially in view of the fact that the targets on public view in the mess hall had been out of the hands of the commission for nearly four months. The committee decided against Sweden this evening. The scores remain the same.

TO PROBE CHINESE SMUGGLING.

Federal Government to Look into "Black Book" Disclosures.

Investigation of the "black book" disclosures of Chinese smuggling into this country will be taken up by the Bureau of Customs and Excise by the Federal government this morning.

Commissioner General of Immigration Campbell announced this important development yesterday. He believed that the "black book" may prove the key to the traffic in white slaves, opium, and Chinese carried on by Orientals which has proved so puzzling to the authorities.

The chief instructor of immigration at Chicago will be placed in charge of the government's investigation there.

"VICTORY" DRAWS CROWD.

Work is Needed.

"A man with an empty stomach, and I mean by that," said Commissioner Newman, "a man who is down and out and deprived of all that makes life worth living, cannot freely forgive those who trespass against him and twist temptation. A man must first work to be charitable and free from temptation. I think the Lord's Prayer was intended first for the man who earns his living by his muscle, and is a prayer for strength that will enable him to make up his mind to the prayer which goes to make up righteous living."

An urgent appeal for closer relationship between the church and the laboring classes was made by Commissioner Siddons. He declared that the greater church was possible only in the event of the church taking an active part in the solution of the all-important social and industrial problems of the country. U. S. REVENUE MEN MAKE WESTERN FISH DRUNK

Funny Ones Have Fine "Jag" After Beer Is Poured into River.

Marion, Ind., Sept. 7.—Multitudes feasted on intoxicated fish hauled in by the hotel boatmen here after 1,300 barrels of beer were dumped into the Mississippi River from an Indiana barge under the direction of the United States revenue officer. The River Mississippi is the Indian equivalent for "sparkling water."

It became indeed sparkling water after the beer was poured in. A stream of pure champagne couldn't have caused more of a lamboze. And people who are usually unshakable wags, leaving all manner of new fangled somersaults, and flopping against each other in frenzied lurches. Carp, catfish, suckers, and occasionally a bass cut crazy capers in the seething glee as they crazed the current.

An army of small boys assembled on an island just below one of the bridges, where the fish with a bridge laugh and a rattle of their rifles. Equipped with ball bats, clubs, boat oars, and other weapons, the boys and men, too, for that matter, waded into the shallow water and waded their way to the shore. Many caught fish in their hands, and every one who waded carried home a string or basketful.

Thousands of pounds were taken out of the river. Boys met not away with the fish. Operations continued all day, but as afternoon drew along the fish seemed to sober up and regain their usual faculties of evasion.

The chief excitement was in putting drunken fish into fresh water. Soon after this was done the victims recovered from their jag and seemed just like normal fish.

Regular fish were not alone in the limelight. Countless crawfish crawled up on the piers of the bridge, and it would have been possible for them to have been scooped up by the barrels. There was an unusually started expression in the "crawdad's" eyes.

NEW COMET ON WAY HERE. Celestial Vagrant Visible Through Small Telescope.

Chicago, Sept. 7.—"Metzalf's comet," which was discovered last Monday, is heading toward the earth at tremendous speed. It was visible to local telescopes tonight.
