"Rag" Dancing Ban Lifted By Authorities of G. W. U.

Tango and Fish Walk Will Be Permitted at the Freshman Ball, if Performed with Propriety and Moderation.

The ban upon "rag" dancing which was pronounced by the authorities of the George Washington University nearly a year ago has at last been lifted...

In removing the ban, the faculty failed to give its stamp of approval to the turkey trot, and there is much uncertainty as to whether this form of dance will be permitted.

The prohibition was revoked upon the request of a committee of freshmen who are desirous of having the most modern dances permitted at the freshman ball...

The ban on "rag" dancing was pronounced immediately following last year's freshman ball. The hall started with waltzes and two-steps, but toward the latter part of the evening the "rag" element was injected into the program...

In permitting "rag" dancing at this year's freshman ball, the faculty demanded that a liberal number of two-steps and waltzes be provided, so that the ball may not appear too "ragged" for the more conservative of the dancers.

DR. GOULD TELLS OF NEW TEACHING

Character-Building Plan Explained at Schoolmen's Club Dinner.

WILL VISIT MANY CITIES

Representative of English Moral Education League to Remain in This Country Until Spring.

Prominent educators of the Capital gathered at the Hotel Continental last night for the first meeting of the season of the Federal Schoolmen's Club...

Dr. Gould, who has been demonstrating the methods advocated by the league before gatherings of teachers and parents, told his hearers that the spirit of this "new" teaching was to make all subjects taught in grade schools contributory to character-building...

The speaker said all pupils should be taught alike, that he would employ the same methods in teaching the American child that he would use in giving instruction to children in Bombay.

Dr. Gould will remain in the United States until the end of the year, demonstrating his work in many of the larger cities. Tomorrow he will make an address at the Church of the Covenant, and will spend next week in Baltimore.

After his last night a great many questions were asked Dr. Gould regarding details of his system, and he was elected an honorary member of the club.

Dr. W. H. Davidson presided at the banquet, and at its conclusion many expressions of regret that he is leaving Washington were heard.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 7.—District Attorney Frederick C. Los Angeles County, prosecutor of the McManis dynamiter, today announced that Orville McManis, confessed dynamiter, and informer on the McManis and other criminals of the Structural Iron Workers' Union, soon will be set free.

McManis' health has been impaired by the two years he has spent in jail. He has been sent away to recuperate. When he is brought back he will be liberated, it is said by those who make his home here in Los Angeles.

21,000 TARIFFS SUSPENDED.

Interstate Commerce Commission Soon to Begin Hearings.

The Interstate Commerce Commission yesterday formally announced that it had suspended until March 22 next, pending investigation, the operation of about 21,000 tariffs filed by carriers operating in official classification territory.

These tariffs show an increase of from 5 to 16 per cent in freight rates in the territory east of the Mississippi River and north of the Ohio and Potomac Rivers. The commission met Monday, November 24, at the date for the beginning of the taking of the testimony and to determine whether the carriers are entitled to the increases asked.

COAL EXPORTS ARE HEAVY.

Total Value for Current Year Expected to Reach \$70,000,000.

The value of coal exports from the United States for the year ending next month will total \$70,000,000 according to an estimate issued yesterday by the Department of Commerce...

Of the exports of coal to foreign countries anthracite forms about one-third and goes almost exclusively to Canada. Of the bituminous Canada is also a large customer, taking \$30,000,000 out of the \$70,000,000 value of foreign countries in the eight months ending with August, though Mexico, Panama, Cuba, and certain other of the West Indies are also large purchasers.
