The President and Mrs. Woodrow Wilson entertained their relatives and the relatives of Mr. Francis Bowes Sayre, who are in Washington to attend the wedding this afternoon, at dinner last night at the White House.

Miss Jessie Wilson and her fiancé, Mr. Francis Sayre, and the members of their bridal party were entertained by Commander MacDougal, U. S. N., and the other officers of the U. S. Navy at dinner on board that vessel last night. Informal dancing followed the dinner.

Miss Jessie Wilson wore the superb diamond necklace by the House of Representatives at the dinner given by President and Mrs. Wilson last Friday night. She will wear it at her wedding this afternoon.

The handsome silver centerpieces presented to her by the United States Supreme Court was used at the dinner on Friday night, and again last night at the White House dinner.

The house guests at the White House were the wedding party. Mr. Robert H. Sayre, mother of the bridegroom; Mr. and Mrs. Joseph H. Wilson, of Baltimore, brother and sister-in-law of the President; Mrs. Robert Ewing of Nashville, Tenn., a cousin of Mrs. Wilson; Mr. and Mrs. Legare Walker, of Somerville, S. C., cousins of Mrs. Wilson; Miss Adeline Scott, Miss Mary Scott, Miss Mary Jane Brown, Miss Mary White, Miss Agnes Winter, and Miss Katherine Woodrow.

Miss Jessie Wilson and her fiancé, Mr. Francis B. Sayre, spent an exceedingly busy day at Calcutta. The afternoon was entirely taken up with the rehearsal for the wedding in which all the members of the bridal party and the President took part. The wedding music was played by Miss Jessie Wilson and the choir boys also gave their program, so that all would be letter perfect at the ceremony tomorrow.

A number of intimate friends and relatives of the bride and bridegroom-elect were permitted to view the preparations. The announcement from the French Ambassador, dean of the corps, that the members of the Diplomatic Corps are to wear their court dress, out of compliment to the bride and bridegroom, is of great interest. The brilliant colors and the glitter of jeweled orders and gold lace will add greatly to a scene which shortly will add greatly to history.

Memorial to be Built Soon.

Construction of the memorial to the dead of the battle ship Maine in Arlington Cemetery will be commenced within a few days. The memorial is to cost \$4,000.

It will be of stone and shaped like the turret of a battleship. The mainmast and fighting top of the battleship will be set in a base of granite, and on the granite base will be carved the names of the dead. It is expected that the work will be completed in eight months.
