DR. POND QUILTS PLACE HE HELD FORTY YEARS Failing Health Compels Him to Resign from Examining Corps of Patent Office.

Dr. W. B. Pond, forty years a member of the examining corps of the Patent Office, yesterday resigned his position because of failing health. Dr. Pond, who is one of the oldest employees of the Patent Office, will relinquish his duties December 1.

In recent years Dr. Pond has had charge of the division which considers inventions affecting civil engineering problems. President Wilson, on hearing of Dr. Pond's resignation, wrote: "It is a pleasure to me to express my appreciation of your long and valuable service and of the high sense of public duty which leads you now to retire."
