**DATE OF INAUGURATION AMENDMENT'S OBJECT**

Senate Judiciary Committee Would Induct Presidents on Second Monday in January Instead March 4.

**CHANGES ARE MADE EASIER**

Two joint resolutions, one proposing to make easier the task of amending the Constitution, and the other providing for a change in the inaugural date and the commencement of terms of Senators and Representatives, have been favorably reported to the Judiciary Committee of the Senate by a subcommittee composed of Senators Ashurst, Clifton and Cullman.

The question raised by both resolutions have been discussed, particularly the first, which was one of the campaign issues of the Bull Moose party in 1912. Considerable opposition is known to exist in the full committee against both propositions, and it is a question whether either of them will see the light of the Senate calendar at the next session.

In the House the proposition to change the inaugural date has been discussed a number of times, Representative Henry of Texas, usually leading the debate in favor of the proposed change. On the last occasion of its discussion, however, the debate took on a partisan aspect and Mr. Henry temporarily withdrew the resolution from consideration.

The Senate joint resolution seeking to make amendments to the Constitution easier was prepared by Senator Cullman. It makes the following provisions for amendments:

Whenever the legislatures of sixteen States shall adopt resolutions proposing any amendment and the same are certified to the President of the United States, or whenever 15 per centum of the voters in twenty-four States present to the President petitions authenticated by the respective governors of the said States proposing any amendment, the President shall submit the same to the several States, acting either by direct vote of the people or by the legislatures, as may be determined by State law provided, that no State, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the Senate.

The joint resolution seeking to bring about a change in the inaugural date was drawn up by Senator Shafer of Colorado, as follows:

"The terms of the President and Vice President of the United States shall commence on the second Monday in January following the election of President and Vice President, and the inauguration shall take place on the first Monday in December following their election."

"The terms of Senators and Representatives shall commence on the first Monday in January following their election."

"There shall be held two regular sessions of each Congress, convening on the first Monday of January each year."

**BOAGS GETS TWELVE YEARS.**  
 Housebreaker Sentenced to Long Term in Penitentiary.

Isaac Boags, colored, was sentenced yesterday by Chief Justice Claiborn to serve twelve years in the penitentiary, Boags pleading guilty to eight charges of housebreaking in July and August last.

Gordon R. Cowie, manager of a garage, recently convicted in Chief Justice Claiborn's court, on the charge of interfering with a deputy marshal in the discharge of his duty, was sentenced yesterday to serve six months at Occoquan and pay a fine of \$50. On the payment of the fine the court directed that the imprisonment be suspended.

**LAND MAY BE SECURED.**

Naval Observatory Property Extension Now Within Reach.

Graham Egerton, solicitor for the Naval Observatory, in a report to the Secretary of the Navy, submitted yesterday submitted his annual report.

There is a good chance, Mr. Egerton says, in speaking of the proposed branch railroad from the eastern tracks of the Pennsylvania Railroad to the navy yard, of the establishment of the government's title as land required for the right of way for the road. The question, he says, cannot be settled for some time.

The last of the land desired by the government in the vicinity of the Naval Observatory, Mr. Egerton says, is to be obtained shortly. An agreement had been made whereby the Normanshire tract will be purchased in two sections, one for \$12,500 and the other for \$4,000. This was made necessary, as an appropriation is needed to buy the smaller tract.
