Printing Establishments in 1909 Turned Out 2,600 Daily Publications. New York Leads List.

In 1909 there were 2,446 separate establishments in the industry, 28,446 persons engaged in the industry...

There were 2,600 daily publications reported in 1909, as compared with 2,425 in 1904.

Of these 2,600 dailies, 700 were morning papers and 1,900 afternoon or evening papers.

The circulation of newspapers published in ten cities—New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, St. Louis, Boston, Cleveland, Baltimore, Pittsburgh, Buffalo, and San Francisco—constituted 71 per cent of the total daily circulation of the entire country for 1909...

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SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

November 30, 1913.

Crossing the Jordan.

Read the text, for I am with thee.

(1) And Joshua rose up early in the morning, and they removed from Shittim, and came to Jordan, and all the children of Israel; and they lodged there before they passed over.

(2) And it came to pass after three days, that the officers went through the midst of the camp.

(3) And they commanded the people, saying, When ye see the ark of the covenant of the Lord your God, and the priests the Levites bearing it, then ye shall remove from your place, and go after it.

(4) Yet there shall be a space between you, and the ark, about two thousand cubits by measure; come not near unto it; that ye may know the way by which ye must go: for ye have not passed this way heretofore.

(5) And Joshua said unto the people, Sanctify yourselves; for tomorrow the Lord will do wonders among you.

(6) And Joshua spake unto the priests, saying, Take up the ark of the covenant, and pass over before the people. And they took up the ark of the covenant, and went before the people.

(7) And the Lord said unto Joshua, The ark of the Lord shall be with thee, and thou shalt be successful wherever thou shalt go: as I was with Moses, so I will be with thee.

(8) And thou shalt command the priests that bear the ark of the covenant, saying, When ye are come to the brink of the waters of Jordan, ye shall stand still in Jordan.

(9) And Joshua said unto the children of Israel, Come hither, and hear the words of the Lord your God.

(10) And Joshua said, Hereby ye shall know that the living God is among you, and that he will without fail drive out from before you the Canaanite, and the Hittite, and the Ivvite, and the Perisite, and the Girgashite, and the Amorit, and the Jebusite.

(11) Behold, the ark of the covenant of the Lord of all the earth passeth over before you into Jordan.

(12) Now, therefore, take ye twelve men out of the tribes of Israel, for every tribe a man.

(13) And it shall come to pass, when the soles of the feet of the priests that bear the ark of the Lord, the Lord of all the earth, shall rest in the waters of Jordan, that the waters of Jordan shall be cut off, even the waters that come down from above; and they shall stand in one heap.

(14) And it came to pass, when the people removed from their tents, to pass over Jordan, the priests that bear the ark of the covenant were before the people.

(15) And when they that bare the ark came unto Jordan, and the feet of the priests that bare the ark were dipped in the brink of the water, (for Jordan overflowed its banks all the time of harvest.)

(16) Then the waters of Jordan came down from above, and rose up in one heap, a great way off, at Adam, the city that is beside Zarethan; and those that were driven forward, the men of the Arabah, even the Salt Sea, were wholly cut off; and the people passed over right against Jericho.

(17) And the priests that bare the ark of the Lord stood firm in the midst of Jordan, and all Israel passed over on dry ground, until all the nation were passed clean over Jordan.

(18) When Israel went forth out of Egypt, the house of Jacob from a people of strange language;

(19) Judah became his sanctuary, Israel his dominion.

(20) The sea saw it, and fled; Jordan was driven back.

(21) The mountains skipped like rams, the little hills like young sheep.

(22) What aileth thee, O sea, that thou fliest? Thou Jordan, that thou turnest back?

(23) Ye mountains, that ye skip like rams; ye little hills, like young sheep?

(24) Down thou earth, at the presence of the Lord, at the presence of the God of Jacob:

(25) Which turned the rock into a pool of water, the flint into a fountain of waters.

The Story.

Between our last lesson and this we have an account of how Joshua called the people to himself, and commanded them to prepare to cross the Jordan and possess the land; giving a special charge to the two and a half tribes that they should now fulfill the conditions upon which the Lord had promised to settle on the east of Jordan, those namely of helping their brethren to gain possession of the land.
