### DEPARTMENTS LIKE OLD CURIOSITY SHOPS

Antiques and Objects of Interest Are Strung Along Corridors in Many of the Buildings.

### HALL OF RECORDS SUGGESTED

Government departments in Washington within the next few years will resemble old curiosity shops, if the present rate is

maintained in accumulating antiques and curios. Although the National Museum, the United States Museum, the Smithsonian Institution, Medical Museum, and Congressional Library are filled with things of interest, each department has its own little museum or collection that it strings along its corridors for the benefit of tourists. In some of the buildings there is not space enough to show the collections and they have been consigned to storage rooms.

In the War Department, for instance, the upper floors are crowded with exhibits. Not only can one see the uniforms worn by United States soldiers at different periods, but one can see exhibits of the sculptors' work, of the artist, and models of the defenses along the coast and inland waters. All these exhibits are placed in the corridors of the building, usually on the top floor.

In the State Department wing of the State, War, and Navy Building portraits of former Secretaries of State, Senators, and foreign diplomats adorn the walls. In one instance the portrait of a foreign diplomat has been relegated to a messengers' room.

On the Navy side the corridors are filled with models of the first and last step in naval architecture and construction. Submarines, aeroplanes, wireless cruisers, and the navy hospital ship, the Solara, can be seen in these models. The model of the Arkansas cost the government \$2,000.

In the Treasury Department the accumulation of paintings of the former Secretaries has overflowed from the walls of the office of the Secretary and his assistants into the corridors adjacent to the Secretary's office. The Revenue-cut Service, which also is in the Treasury Department, has an interesting exhibit, but only part of it can be seen, as there is not sufficient space in the building to display it.

The Patent Office locks its exhibits in one room where the general public cannot find them, that is to say, it is so near the top of the building, and in such an out of the way corner that half the clerks do not know that the government pays four clerks \$600 a year salary to keep up the exhibit and prevent curious hunters from carrying away valuable models of patents. The Indian Office and the Land Office each has exhibits, but they also are in such unfrequented places that the average tourist never would be able to find them.

The need of a hall of records, or a building to house these exhibits, has been suggested in a request for an appropriation, now before Congress. No action has been taken on it, and it seems that the measure will "die" in committee.

### PASTOR LAUDS HOME LIFE

Revival of Family Life Would Do More Than Proposed Reforms.
