DISTRICT IS HIT IN HOUSE BILLS. Two Pass on Viva Voice Votes, One Affecting Half-and-Half System. OTHER REFUNDS BIG SUM. Prouty Joint Resolution and Johnson Measure Now Ready to Go to Senate.

Two District measures were passed in the House on viva voice votes by some two-score members yesterday. The first was the Prouty joint resolution calling for the repayment to the government of \$1,000,000 said to be due for moneys expended in behalf of the District for the payment of interest on the District 5 per cent bonds in 1913 and 1914.

The Johnson bill involves a distinguished scheme to insert into House precedents a weapon which may be turned against the half-and-half plan at some future time, and which will make itself evident when the appropriation bill comes up for consideration. In part, it reads as follows:

That no money collected by the District on account of any license to manufacture or sell spirituous liquors shall be expended in the payment of any debt of the District which Congress has committed the United States to participate in.

That no money collected by the District on account of rental paid by the Washington Market Company; or on account of tolls over the bridge across the Potomac River, which bridge is generally known as the Highway Bridge; or on account of the fish wharf or any other wharf; or on account of any rental or income whatsoever from any real estate, the legal or equitable title to which is in the United States; or on account of any estate in reversion or remainder, shall be expended in payment of any debt of the District which Congress has committed the United States to participate in.


