WOMAN'S CONSTITUTIONAL ASSOCIATION

A resolution favoring the bill before Congress, which provides that all those American women who have indulged in window smashing, arson and other delinquencies of suffrage campaigning in London, shall be punished under the law on their return to this country, was unanimously adopted by the Woman's United States Constitutional Association, of which Dr. Mary Walker is president, at a meeting in Woodward & Lothrop's Auditorium yesterday afternoon.

The principal purpose of the association is to uphold the constitution. Membership is free and no collection or assessments are made. The insignia of the association adopted yesterday was the American flag with the words "Woman's United States Constitutional Association" in large letters across the stripes.

U. S. TRIES DESPERATELY FOR PEACE AT VERA CRUZ

Navy Department Directs Badger to Reinstall Civil Officers and Let Mexican Flag Fly.

Extraordinary efforts which the administration is making to preserve the outward appearance of a peaceful blockade at Vera Cruz were clearly indicated by this bulletin given out at the Navy Department last night.

Admiral Badger has been directed at his discretion to allow civil officers at Vera Cruz that were duly elected by the people and deposed by Huerta to resume their civil authority, and permit the Mexican flag to be displayed from the school houses and public buildings, except those an actual occupation by the United States authorities.

Charge Nelson O'Shaughnessy will leave Mexico City with his suite at 7 a. m. today. He will be escorted by Andrew Jackson City to Vera Cruz by a guard of federal soldiers under the personal command of Col. Huerta, of the Mexican regular army, and the provisional President.

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


