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BURNS' IRE AROUSED BY ATLANTA POLICE.

ARREST OF HIS AID IS ASKED.

Chicago, May 5.—Detective William J. Burns fairly bristled with indignation today. He called the Atlanta police "a bunch of scoundrels," promised to return to the Georgia capital within a short time to carry the war to the police in the Frank case.

Reports from Atlanta telling of charges of bribery, perjury, and attempts to manufacture evidence against the negro, Jim Conley, brought against Burns' detestable, caused the Burns' anger. These charges were made at the hearing in the extraordinary motion for a new trial for Leo M. Frank, convicted of the murder of Mary Phagan, the little factory girl of Atlanta, May 5.—Following the reading of affidavits today before Judge Hill that bribery had been used in an effort to clear Leo M. Frank, convicted of the murder of the Phagan girl, Solicitor Dorney asked for the arrest of Dan S. Lebo, chief of the New Orleans branch of the Burns' agency.

Other affidavits hit at Detective C. W. Burke, private detective for the attorneys for the defense. Burke was charged with attempted bribery. He denied he had attempted bribery.

George Epps, a newsboy who recently gave an affidavit before Detective John Beck of the local bureau, framed testimony against Frank, swore he had been enticed into going to Birmingham and intimidated into making this affidavit by C. W. Burke, B. Bernard and Jimmy Wrenn.

SECOND BECKER TRIAL WILL COMMENCE TODAY.

Whitman as a result of the confession of Earl Tombs, chief of the police, that he had given a false testimony in the hearing for a final attempt to get a new trial for the four-month killing of Herman Rosenthal.
