TRY TO KEEP MILK CLEAN

Department of Agriculture Issues Warning on Danger in Summer

CO-OPERATION IS NEEDED

Housewife's Carelessness Can Nullify Efforts of Dealer and Health Officers, It Is Said.

Beware of unclean milk! Such a warning is being spread broadcast over the nation by the Department of Agriculture, whose experts realize that during hot weather milk is particularly susceptible to contamination.

In planning a house it is wise to arrange a refrigerator set in the wall with an opening on the outside.

Don't Replace Cap. The cap and neck of a milk bottle should be washed and carefully wiped with a clean cloth before the cap is removed.

The original cap should not be replaced, but instead an inverted glass should be put over the top of the bottle.

Co-operation Necessary. "In any case," says the warning, "bottles should be given reasonable care before being returned to their owner."
