

FRONT ROYAL TO DRAW CROWD AT HORSE SHOW

Keen Interest Is Being Shown Here by Sportsmen Regarding the Events July 22-23.

Much interest is being shown in Washington circles regarding the Front Royal Horse Show on July 22 and 23. Front Royal is the home of the army remount depot, and the twenty-three breeding stallions of the Department of Agriculture, all of which will be on exhibition at this show.

A troop of cavalry and the Fifth Cavalry Band from Fort Myer have been ordered to be present, the troop to march overland, leaving Fort Myer tomorrow morning, and the band to proceed by rail Tuesday.

Capt. R. M. Thompson has presented a handsome cup and the National Remount Association of Washington furnishes certain money prizes. The Front Royal Steeplechase Association donates prizes aggregating \$2,000. All the best show horses in Virginia are entered in riding, driving and hunt classes and the entries for four flat races and two steeplechases each day are filed.

Front Royal is easily reached from Washington. Special rates are offered by the Southern and Norfolk and Western Railroads.

Capt. W. W. Whitehead, depot quartermaster, U. S. A., is vice president of the Front Royal Steeplechase Association, and Capt. Archie Miller, Quartermaster Corps, U. S. A., is general manager. The object of this association is to promote the breeding of better remnants for the army.

The famous stallions presented to the government by August Belmont—Henry of Navarre, Octagon, Belvoir, Dandy Rock, and Footprint, the last three bred by the great race horse, Rockland—will be exhibited.

The governor of Virginia, H. C. Stuart, Gen. Leonard Wood, Maj. Gen. J. B. Aleshire, Maj. Gen. George C. Barnett, commanding the Marine Corps, are a few of the distinguished visitors who are expected to attend the show.

She said she had gone to the portrait gallery to do all the damage she could in retaliation for the arrest of Mrs. Fankhurst.

In the District Courts.

Justice Anderson yesterday refused the motion for a new trial for Dr. Thomas J. Kemp, against whom a jury recently returned a verdict for \$10,000 in favor of Matthew G. Lepley, architect, for malpractice prosecution. An appeal probably will be noted. Attorneys Frank J. Hogan and Milton A. Kaufman appeared for Lepley and Attorneys A. A. Birney and A. D. Smith for the physician.

Chester Cochran, nineteen years of age, who pleaded guilty to breaking open his mother's trunk while she was sick in a hospital and stealing therefrom \$50, was placed on probation yesterday by Justice Gould.

Alexander J. Adams, formerly a butler for Gen. George Barnett, of the Marine Corps, was also placed on probation following his plea of guilty to the charge of having stolen jewelry from his employer. He was sent part of the jewelry back to the owner from New York.

Daniel V. Jauch, the watchman who placed several sticks of dynamite beneath the office of the Secretary of Agriculture a few weeks ago, was indicted yesterday by the grand jury on the charge of violating the section of the District code, prohibiting putting an explosive in any public building. Jauch said afterward, it is alleged, that he had put the dynamite there with the idea of framing a heroic rescue to win promotion for himself.

Six husbands were indicted on the charge of nonsupport. They were: Frank Merrill, Ernest Taylor, George H. Massey, Robert Armstrong, Lester G. Mowery, and Harry C. Houser. William E. Borden was indicted for alleged forgery.
