

Cape Cod Canal Will Open Wednesday ITS TRAFFIC WILL BE TWICE THAT OF PANAMA Means Great Saving to Coast Trade

Next Wednesday there will be opened across the long arm of Cape Cod, Mass., a waterway which probably will accommodate more tonnage than the Panama Canal for a good many years. This will surprise many, for the Cape Cod Canal work has been done without much blare of trumpets or Congressional oratory. But it is a most notable achievement, and puts much nearer the realization the dream of an all inland waterway from Maine to Florida.

So far no trace of the bandits has been found.

MAY BUILD NEW POOL
