

ENGLISH CRUISER SINKS

McADOO RUSHES RELIEF FUNDS

Makes \$300,000 Available for Ambassador Page to Aid Refugees.

EVOLVES A NEW PLAN

Steamship Tennessee Sails Today, but Will Be Ten Days Reaching Europe.

Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo announced last night that arrangements had been perfected for placing \$300,000 immediately at the disposal of Ambassador Page at London to be used in relieving stranded Americans.

Mr. McAdoo at the same time issued a statement setting forth the details of the perfected plan which was formulated and approved by the President yesterday afternoon for getting funds to our nationals in Europe.

At a conference between Secretary McAdoo, Secretary Bryan, Secretary of War Garrison and other members of the committee which has been placed in charge of the relief work by President Wilson, it was decided to abandon the plan of having deposits of money at the State Department from friends of Americans who are without funds abroad, with the view of having the amount of such deposits paid out to the designated Americans by diplomatic and consular agents abroad.

A substitute plan was agreed upon which permits the deposit of funds at the Treasury Department and at the subtreasuries to be accepted and drawn against in any part of Europe where the funds to be transported on the Tennessee are available.

Secretary McAdoo announced that payment on deposits would be made as quickly as cablegrams could be sent to our ambassadors and other representatives. Later, when the crisis has been passed, he said, the depositors of funds with the government may be reimbursed out of whatever remains of the \$2,500,000 appropriation made by Congress Tuesday.

Officials refused to make concrete the full sum of gold to be carried on the Tennessee, consisting of the larger part of the appropriated \$2,500,000 and sums forwarded through the Treasury by the bankers of New York.

SENATE PASSES FIRST OF WILSON TRUST BILLS

Measure Creating Federal Trade Commission Goes Through by Vote of 53 to 16.

ONE IMPORTANT AMENDMENT

The Federal Trade Commission bill, the first of the administration's three anti-trust bills to be considered by the Senate, was passed yesterday evening by a vote of 53 to 16.

The following Republicans voted for the bill: Brady, Bristol, Clapp, Crawford, Cummins, Fall, Gronna, Jones, Kenyon, Norris, Perkins and Sterling. The only important amendment adopted was one by Senator Saulsbury, of Delaware, providing that corporations having capitalization of \$500,000 should maintain an office in Washington to accept service.

The bill establishes a Federal Trade Commission, to be composed of five members, not more than three of whom shall be members of the same political party. The President will make the appointments, subject to confirmation by the Senate.

The commissioners will draw salaries of \$10,000 a year each, and the bill provides for a secretary at \$5,000 an assistant secretary at \$4,000. The President may remove any commissioner "for inefficiency, neglect of duty, or malfeasance in office."

With the organization of the Federal Trade Commission, the Bureau of Corporations shall cease to exist as such, but the offices of commissioner and deputy commissioner of corporations will be abolished and the working force of the office merged with the trade commission. It is generally expected that the President will name Joseph E. Davies, of Wisconsin, at present Commissioner of Corporations, at the head of the new commission.

The commission is given authority to investigate the organization, business, financial condition, conduct, practices and management of any corporation engaged in commerce. It is authorized to require corporations to produce all their books and other records.

TWO GERMAN LINERS SAFE

Philadelphia, Aug. 5.—The North German Lloyd liner Brandenburg docked here today after running for the past two days under forced draught and without lights. The Prinz Oskar, of the Hamburg-American Line, also arrived today. Both ships were a day ahead of their schedules.

The Brandenburg sailed from Bremen on July 23 with 280 passengers for Philadelphia and 28 for Galveston. The Prinz Oskar sailed from Hamburg on July 23 with 280 passengers.

It is said by the steamship companies that both liners will remain in this port indefinitely. There are now twenty-three foreign ships held up at this port, and thirty more are due within the next six days. No ships have left this port since last Sunday, and insurance rates are so high that they are practically prohibitive.

DETAILED AS WAR OBSERVERS.
