Treaties Were Set at Naught, He Tells Parliament in Urgent Plea for Patriotism.

TRIED TO MAINTAIN PEACE

Special Cable to The Washington Herald. London, Sept. 18.—"We are fighting for a worthy purpose and we will not lay down our arms until this purpose is achieved."

These ringing words were sounded by King George in the House of Commons today in his speech proroguing Parliament.

The speech of the King was devoted solely to the war and to the part which England is playing in the titanic struggle against Germany and Austria.

CATHOLIC CHARITIES OBJECT OF CONFERENCE

Five Hundred Delegates Will Meet Tomorrow for Four Days' Session at Catholic University.

Five hundred delegates are expected to attend the opening meeting at Catholic University tomorrow of the third biennial convention of the National Conference of Catholic Charities.

The convention will be in session for four days. It will be opened at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning with solemn high mass in Gibbon's Hall Chapel.

Delegations from Chicago, Pittsburgh, Brooklyn, New York, Boston, and Philadelphia are expected to arrive today to prepare to help in the business, which will represent all of the charities of the Catholic Church in America.

President Wilson will receive the delegates at the White House at 2:15 o'clock Monday afternoon. Tuesday afternoon the delegates will be the guests of Washington on an automobile tour of the District.

ANACOSTIANS LINED UP FOR SALOON FIGHT

Excise Board Will Be Petitioned to Declare Suburban Residential One or Deny Renewal of Licenses.

Final plans are being made by the Anacostia Federation for Social Service for presenting its proposition before the District Excise Board, requesting that the suburb be declared a purely residential one, and thereby automatically closing the saloons; or that renewal of the licenses be refused.

The federation has 700 signatures to petitions addressed to the board asking that this be done, and all signers reside in Anacostia proper and are more than twenty-one years of age.

They also have a number of petitions signed by the girls and boys of the suburb, asking that the saloons be eliminated from the suburb. It is proposed to have a large street parade just before it is time to present the claim of the federation, in order that every one might be familiar with the proceedings.

The matter will have to be presented to the board by November 1 next.

The work of placing the public schools in the eastern section of the District in condition for the opening on Monday morning will be completed today. Janitors and their assistants have been busily engaged during the week. Yesterday a number of the teachers were at the schools to receive enrollment of new scholars, and they will also be there today.

GET THEIR DRINK EASILY

Two "U. S. Revenue Officers" Are Sought by Police.

A comparatively facile way to ease a drink out of a bartender whose cold and haughty mien indicates a constitutional intolerance of needs by financially incompetent persons is to impersonate a United States internal revenue officer at whatever bar is being frequented. According to the Washington police, it is done like this:

Place right foot on the brass rail that for that purpose, lean over in confidential manner toward the bartender and say, "I'm a revenue officer, pal, and I've got to get a sample of your booze. We're trying to trace a quantity of stuff that has been sold out of bond, you know."

The bartender promptly passes over a drink, a gin, a half pint, a pint, a quart or whatever reasonable quantity the "revenue officer" says is necessary for a thorough analysis.

Two such revenue officers are now sought by the police, who have received several complaints from excise-license holders.

RESERVE BOARD EXPANDING

New Federal Bureau Soon Must Seek Quarters of Its Own.

The Federal Reserve Board is expected shortly to move into quarters of its own. Since its inception, the board has grown rapidly, and it is believed that there will be between 600 and 1,000 employees before another year has elapsed.

A large clerical force is at work under Parker Willis, in the office of the secretary, Milton C. Elliott, counsel for the board, already has several clerks under him in the legal bureau and is expected soon to ask for an increase.

An office of reports, a disbursing office, and a corps of actuaries and examiners are expected further to increase the pay roll.

Expansion of the office will be taken care of at temporary headquarters in the Treasury building for six months. By that time, it is predicted, the board will have offices leased and eventually will have a building erected for it.
