FARMER BREAKS NECK IN FALL FROM TREE

Daniel Baker, of Fairfax County, Not Expected to Recover—Alexandria Infantry Inspected.

Alexandria, Va., Sept. 23.—Daniel Baker, about forty-eight years old, a farmer, living at Accotink, Fairfax County, lies at the Alexandria Hospital, having broken his neck in a fall from a tree.

Mr. Baker fell from a pear tree, from which he was gathering fruit, yesterday afternoon. He is being treated by Dr. S. B. Moore. But little hope is held out for his recovery.

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WOULD CUT COST OF LIVING.

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PRISONERS ARE NEEDED AT OCCOQUAN, HE SAYS

Supt. Whittaker, in Report, Asserts Institution Is Deprived of Services of Best Mechanics.

W. H. Whittaker, superintendent of the District workhouse at Occoquan, suggests in his annual report filed with the Board of Charities yesterday, that a building near the courts for the detention of prisoners until they are sent to Occoquan would provide a less expensive and more practical method of handling the District prisoners than the present system which requires the maintenance of the Washington jail.

In defense of his plan of using a detention building, Mr. Whittaker says: "It would be far better from the standpoint of sanitation, discipline and the economic management of the penal system of the District."

"In our institution we have a great amount of work in all departments, such as plumbing, carpentering, blacksmithing, etc. With the dual institutions, as we have them now, we are often deprived of the services of the best mechanics that are sentenced to this institution."

The report also emphasizes the need of an industrial railroad for transportation of the prisoners and commodities used at the workhouse. A survey for this proposed road leads from the wharf at Occoquan Creek to the site of the proposed new District reformatory near the Richmond, Fredericksburg, and Potomac Railroad. An appropriation for a permanent chaplain at the institution is asked.

At last night's meeting a resolution was adopted strongly protesting against granting a saloon license in First street in the neighborhood of the M Street High School.




