EXPECTS WRIGHT  
TO RESIGN SOON

Member of Committee Looks  
for Announcement Within  
a Few Days.

REPORT GOES UNDENIED

Reason Also to Believe Justice Gould  
Contemplates Retiring in Order to  
Enter Active Practice.

A speaker of the subcommittee which has been investigating charges of official misconduct against Justice Daniel Thew Wright, of the District Supreme Court, told a representative of the Washington Herald yesterday that he would be surprised if the resignation of the accused justice had not been made public within a few days.

Coming on top of persistent reports from well-informed quarters that Justice Wright has placed his resignation at the disposal of the committee, the retirement of the local jurist is taken for granted generally, despite recent denials.

Report said October 15. Reports which could not be verified officially yesterday, indicate that his resignation might be made public within a week's time, by the end of October 15.

As reported in the Washington Herald yesterday the appointment of Representative McCoy to the vacancy created there by the resignation of Justice Wright, of the local branch, has brought matters to a head, particularly in view of the semi-official announcement that was completed at a meeting yesterday afternoon in the office of the Globe-Wernicke Company. The show will be held in a large hall of the Globe-Wernicke Building next October 22.

The object of this show is to boost the "Made-in-America" movement, and the exhibits will be intended to show the superiority of articles made in this country. W. C. Campbell presided at yesterday's meeting.

The Washington Herald printed this report in July, and it was denied by Justice Gould. Despite this denial, there is reason to believe that Justice Gould contemplates retiring.

In the event of Justice Wright's resignation, it is believed that all proceedings against him will be dropped on recommendation of the subcommittee. It is reported that Justice Wright's resignation is made provisionally, with the understanding that no report on the case be made to the Senate.

MELLEN WILL CONTINUE  
HIS TESTIMONY TODAY

Criminal Prosecutions Will Be Based  
on New Haven's Own Records of  
Directors' Meetings.

New York, Sept. 30.—Criminal prosecution of the high financiers of the New Haven Railroad will be based largely, it was disclosed today, on the New Haven's own records of its directors' meetings.

These documents are said to offer mute evidence of the activities of each individual director relative to the acquisition of competitive properties which the government holds were obtained in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

Charles E. Mellen, president of the railroad when it was seized control of both the land and water commerce of New England, was seen as a witness before the Federal grand jury today.

Almost simultaneously with his appearance Assistant Secretary Humpstead, of the New Haven, brought two bundles of documents which had been subpoenaed. Whether or not these documents were minutes of directors' meetings could not be learned.

Mr. Mellen is expected to give further and still more vital testimony tomorrow. How far the grand jury is investigating the alleged conspiracy, which is alleged to have been formed by the financial masters of the road to extend and entrench its monopoly.

SHIP TO BE CHARTERED FOR GERMAN PRODUCTS

Vessel Will Be Sent to Rotterdam to Bring Back Needed Materials as Result of Conference Here.

As a result of a conference of commercial interests and government officials held here yesterday afternoon, an American ship probably will be chartered to go to Germany for a cargo of materials, the lack of which is now embarrassing American manufacturers.

The materials involved are dyes, textiles, medicines, leather, paints, inks, pharmaceutical chemicals, cyanide, sugar beet molasses, and potash.

The German government has consented to the exportation of enough of these products to meet the needs of American industries. The plan is to ship the materials from Germany into Holland, and put them on board the American ship at Rotterdam.
