CITY BOOSTERS MEET MONDAY

Committee Will Launch Campaign at Home of Mrs. Henderson.

EXCURSIONS ARE URGED

R. P. Andrews, Cuno H. Rudolph, W. F. Guide, and Newspaper Men Will Form Definite Plans.

The committee of seven merchants and newspaper men, who will manage the campaign to attract American tourists to their own National Capital, will get a real start next Monday evening, when they will be the guests at dinner of Mrs. John B. Henderson at her home at Sixteenth street and Florida avenue.

Numerous Ways Suggested.

Ways of drawing people here are numerous and already Messrs. Andrews, Guide and Rudolph are turning over in their minds some of the more promising ones.

One reported in The Herald yesterday—that of sending Frederick L. Fishback, a Washington lawyer, into the States with his remarkable collection of Washington lantern slides to meet crowds and show them their Capital on canvas and talk to them directly—has met with general approval. Mr. Andrews strongly endorsed the idea yesterday. He was not in the city Wednesday when it was suggested by Washington Topham, the leather goods merchant. A meeting will be arranged between the committee and Mr. Fishback in order that the proposition may be talked over.

Others Would Co-operate.

Similar effort might be directed with equal, if not greater, success toward the National Capital. Tourist agencies here and there can be depended upon. It is thought, to co-operate with the committee by assisting railroad agents in making up the tourist parties.

The other class of travelers the committee has in mind—those who make it their pleasure to spend several months each year on tour and who usually go alone or in family parties—will, of course, be reached in a different way. There are thousands of them in this country, and now that the gates of Europe practically are closed to them, it is thought that must tour their own country. It is remarkable, but true, that thousands of wealthy Americans have never made a trip to the Nation's Capital. It is thought it would be necessary only to convince these folk that a trip to Washington would satisfy them.

AUSTRIANS DEFEATED, PETROGRAD CLAIMS

Russians Report No Change on East Prussian and Central Vistula Fronts.

By FRANCIS LAVELLE MURRAY. Petrograd, Oct. 15.—The Russian general staff late tonight issued the following statement: "There is no change to report on the East Prussian and Central Vistula fronts. "South of Przemyśl a Russian column engaged and defeated the Austrians, taking seven officers and 500 soldiers prisoners and capturing many rapid-fire guns."

The Petrograd Courier publishes the important statement that the German force which entered the region of Warsaw has been cut in two after two days' hard fighting, and has been driven back to the line represented by Lodz-Petrokoff-Kielce. The victorious Russians are still advancing against them. The number of prisoners captured by the Russians is stated to be at least 1,000.

EMBASSIES CONTINUE BELGIAN CONTROVERSY

Germany Says Britain Told Belgium to Fight Kaiser and Then Left Her Without Help.

DOCUMENTS TO BE PUBLISHED

The controversy between the German and British embassies regarding the significance of documents in German authorities reported in the Belgian archives at Brussels regarding military arrangements between the Belgian and British governments was continued yesterday, when Ambassador Bernstorff issued a statement in reply to the answer of the British Ambassador to the earlier statement of the German envoy.

The German contention is that these documents prove that Belgian neutrality has in reality been non-existent since 1906, because of the alleged arrangements for the transportation of British troops into and through Belgium. The British reply is that even if such documents as are alleged were really found in the Belgian archives they prove nothing, except that the Belgian government had found the attitude of Germany so menacing that she felt compelled to consult with military experts of the British government with regard to possible action in case of certain contingencies arising.

Count von Bernstorff's reply follows: "Concerning the Anglo-Belgian military agreement existing since 1906, a formal offer had been made by England which provides nothing. The documents are in the hands of the German authorities and will be published in full. The fact remains that a so-called 'neutral' country concluded a military agreement with England which provided for landing British troops in this 'neutral' country. The documents prove that by its own free will, 'neutral Belgium' accepted the British offer and decided to fight on the side of the allies."

"England instigated Belgium to go to war, and when the time came to protect the unfortunate little country it was left to its own resources. Germany, on the other hand, who had heard of Belgium's agreement with England, at the beginning of the war offered to protect Belgium and to pay full indemnity for her losses. Germany would have religiously kept her promise. The documents found in Brussels prove that as far back as 1906 England was systematically trying to bring about the condition which has now forced war on Germany."

LAST RITES FOR KING CAROL

Final Services Held at Bucharest for Late Ruler of Roumania.

London, Oct. 15.—Final services over the body of the late King Carol of Roumania were concluded today with impressive ceremonies in the Convent Curier Twargan in Bucharest, according to an Exchange Telegram dispatch from the Roumanian capital.

JUDGES IN AUTO CRASH RETURNING FROM COURT

Machine Going Toward Marlboro Runs Into One Containing Jurists Beall and Camaher.

Upper Marlboro, Md., Oct. 15.—Judges Filmore Beall and B. Harris Camaher, while going from court here last night, narrowly escaped being seriously injured when their machine was run into by another automobile going toward Marlboro.

Besides the judges, the car was occupied by clerk of the Court E. D. Hall and Court Stenographer Robert G. MacCartee.

The automobile from Washington was said to have had Maryland license 11298 and a District of Columbia license 1824. Judge Camaher was painfully cut about the forehead, arm and hand, while Judge Beall suffered from a bruised side. Dr. John E. AUSTRIANS REPULSED ON LEFT, SAYS SERVA

Belgrade in No Danger of Capture. Food Plentiful and Exports Will Be Permitted.

Nish, Oct. 15.—The following statement has been issued by the Serbian war office: "On Sunday night the enemy attempted two attacks on the extreme right wing, Svorsnik-Losnitza, from which they were repulsed with heavy losses to the Austrians. (Svorsnik is in Eastern Bosnia on the River Drina, which separates Bosnia from Austria. Losnitza is about fifteen miles north of Svorsnik, on the Serbian side of the Drina.)

"On Monday morning the enemy attempted to attack the Serbians twice on the left bank of the Save in the direction of Great Little Zingalia, but were repulsed on each occasion with great loss."

The government announces that Belgrade is no longer in danger of capture by the Austrians. The announcement further says that war pensions will be paid, beginning today, and that food is so plentiful in Serbia that the export of beef and any other foodstuffs will be permitted henceforth.

RUSSIANS PLAN TO DEFEND WARSAW AGAINST INVADERS

Petrograd, Oct. 15.—It is reported that no attempt will be made to defend Warsaw with the following notice: "The commander of the armies announced to the inhabitants that they can regard impending events with tranquillity, as Warsaw will be defended to the uttermost."



The girl was Olga Kerr, nineteen years old, the daughter of Judge Carl F. Kerr. The hero is Dr. John J. Motzner, twenty-seven, and medical inspector in the Newark high schools.

So when the doctor informed the girl's teacher yesterday that he thought Miss Olga's eyes should be examined, and a few minutes later two young persons were seen to steal into an automobile and dash away, the sleuths came in a car, took after them and brought them back. When confronted by irate Father the jurist—very irate—exclaimed that the couple were total strangers to him.
