

SAVS COTTON GROWERS URGENTLY NEED HELP

Former Gov. Noe, of Mississippi, Declares Their Condition Exceedingly Critical.

Former Gov. E. F. Noe, of Mississippi, who is stopping at the Elliott House, says that the condition of the cotton growers of the South is exceedingly critical.

"The condition of the cotton growers of the South, especially where it subsides, in many sections, all else is exceedingly critical. After all expenses most of it on borrowed capital, had been incurred, on a basis of \$5 a bale, the price suddenly dropped to about \$2 a bale with unannounced indications, not less some early and radical action be taken, of descending to indefinitely lower levels.

COLORED MEN URGED TO SHOW STRENGTH

Rev. O. S. Simms Principal Speaker at Yesterday's Session of Union Revival Meeting.

Several meetings were held at the Union revival meeting yesterday at Cosmoopolitan Baptist Church, N street northwest, between Ninth and Tenth streets, under the auspices of the National Colored Baptist Evangelistic Alliance of America. Rev. Simon P. W. Drew, president of the alliance, presided. Rev. O. S. Simms, of Pittsburgh, an evangelist and a graduate of the Union University, was the principal speaker. He preached at 11 a. m., subject "Our Vow to God." At 2:30 p. m. was the men's meeting, subject "Men Be Strong." At 8 p. m. he preached again, subject "Handwriting on the Wall." He compared Belshazzar's Feast with the present war in Europe, being ruled by kings today. He urged all of the colored people to refrain from drinking, gambling, and dancing. He denounced Sunday amusements, such as theaters and excursions. He praised citizens breaking up the red light houses and reducing the great number of saloons.

Dr. Simms was aided by the following speakers: Rev. Simon P. W. Drew, Rev. Patterson Patrick, of Philadelphia; Rev. W. H. A. Morton, pastor of Little Ark Baptist Church; Rev. J. Edward Kent, of Shiloh Baptist Church; Rev. J. C. Beaman, of Beulah Baptist Church, Virginia, Va.; Rev. J. H. Johnson, of Friendship Baptist Church; Rev. E. B. Williams, Rev. Mrs. Mason Frye, of Bethlehem Baptist Church.

Committee on Canvas—William Crosby, chairman; Earl Williams, secretary; Oscar C. Smith, Levi Park, William Waring, Lizzie M. King, Henrietta Atwell, Julia Palmer, Hattie Anderson, Hattie Mackell, Carrie Griffin, Harriet Mark, Rev. Howard Barnes, J. C. Bell, Hester Gregory, Rev. Mrs. B. Drew, William Lewis, Lizzie Mackell, Rev. E. B. Williams, made its report of the different places visited, which included 200 homes, 100 saloons, 50 barber shops, 25 pool rooms, 20 club houses, three hospitals, five hotels. During the meeting 500 requests for prayer for the unaved and sick persons were made. One hundred and twenty-five have been saved and gave their names and signified their intention to lead a new life. Fully 10,000 have attended these meetings since started.

DECREE TIES UP ESTATE.

Charles Early, Deceased, and J. J. Lampton Adjudged Guilty.

Justice Stafford, of the District Supreme Court, yesterday signed the decree against Charles Early, or his estate, and James J. Lampton, real estate agents, adjudging them guilty of concealment and misrepresentations in the management of the affairs of Miss Margaret C. Sands. Mr. Early died recently and his will, disposing of a large estate, had been offered to probate. The court's order will tie up this estate indefinitely. The decree refers the matter to William W. Milan, a special auditor, to state an account between the two agents and Miss Sands. In addition the court rules that the agents owe Miss Sands \$7,500 with interest as the result of the sale of the Mintwood home. The court found that Early & Lampton represented the purchasers, too, in disposing of Miss Sands' properties and held that, therefore, they should receive no commission whatever for their work on her behalf. That they did not properly account to their client for the sale of properties situated near the navy yard was also found by the court. Attorney George E. Sullivan appeared for Miss Sands, J. J. Darlington for the Early estate, and Charles Poe for Lampton.

FRIEDLANDER'S ESTATE DISPOSED OF IN WILL

Widow, Brothers, and Sisters to Share as Beneficiaries—Other Testaments Filed for Probate.

The estate of Harry Friedlander, a pioneer haberdasher of this city, who died recently at Atlantic City, is divided between his widow, Sarah Friedlander, and his brothers and sisters by a will filed for probate yesterday. All the jewelry is left to a brother, Philip, of New York. To this brother is left all the real estate and life insurance the latter totaling approximately \$25,000 in trust for the benefit of the wife for life. At her death the trustee is to pay \$7,500 each to Helen and Lillian Friedlander, two nieces living in New York, and divide the remainder equally between the brothers and sisters. They are Philip, George, of this city; Aaron, of New York; Anna Elias Friedlander, of New York; Mrs. Raphael Lewinsohn, and Charles Friedlander. Stock of the Bank of Commerce and Savings, together with the deposits therein, are to be divided between the widow and two brothers, George and Philip. Ella Mitchell, a servant, is bequeathed \$100. Mrs. Friedlander and the brother, George, are appointed executors. The real estate includes premises, 914 Massachusetts avenue northwest, the Avon apartment house, at 1108 Columbia Road, and an undivided interest in a property at Seventh street.

MEETS TO AID NAVAL MILITIA.

The general board of the Naval Militia, created by law last winter, assembled here in Washington yesterday for a series of meetings, which will continue throughout the week.

The purpose for which the board was created was to aid the development and efficiency of the naval militia as a supplementary force to the navy and to increase the co-operation between the navy and naval militia. One of the questions which the board took up following a brief conference with Secretary Daniels yesterday was the advisability of sending the naval militia forces of the Eastern States through the Panama Canal to the San Francisco Exposition.

PROPERTY OWNERS HARD HIT.

Will Be Forced to Pay Heavily for Street Improvements.

If Congress approves the estimates of the Commissioners for street improvements, the burden of taxation, as provided under the Borland amendment, will fall most heavily on the citizens of the northeast and southwest sections of the city. Although all of the citizens' associations of the District and vicinity protested to the Commissioners the right of the District authorities to make street improvements for which the people would have to pay, without the people's consent, the estimates are very liberal and since the Borland amendment is in effect, the citizens will be compelled to pay their share of the improvement costs. The residents of the suburbs were very generous in listing the streets they desired improved because they claim that the kind of streets—macadam roads—laid in their sections do not come under the Borland measure.
