

Georgeon Elects Track and Base Captains—Vigilants

Eastern Turfmen Will Soon Ship to Juarez

Meeting at Famous Southern Track Will Start on Thanksgiving Day—To Hold One Hundred Days of Racing.

Laurel Park, Md., Oct. 25.—With the end of the 1914 racing season hereabouts, almost as one might say in view, horsemen are making arrangements for the coming winter. Many of the more pretentious racing establishments will go into winter quarters, while a goodly number have decided to race their strings at the Juarez course in Mexico. The meeting at this place, commencing as in former years on Thanksgiving Day, this season happens to fall on November 25. With but few exceptions, those who have previously campaigned their horses at this Southern course in previous years will again be in evidence, which many welcome. Eastern turfmen have signified their intention to ship to Juarez at the close of the Pimlico meeting.

Through the Juarez course has been the stamping ground in winter for horsemen who race over the Western and Kentucky circuits in the summer, each seeking an unbroken of happening previously in the history of winter racing. TOM M'CARTY, COUSIN OF LUTHER, ASPIRANT FOR HEAVYWEIGHT HONORS



VIGILANT ELEVEN DEFEATS PATRIOTS
