They Believe Japan and Germany Intend Invading Gotham and Frisco.

OUR FORCES INADEQUATE

Colonel Says He Will Probably Designate Countries Meant in Statement After Election Day.

The statement by Col. Roosevelt at Princeton that he had seen the war plans of two nations for the capture and holding for ransom of great American cities attracted much attention here yesterday.

Nothing to Prevent It. It is admitted with the utmost frankness by all men familiar with the military situation in the United States that there is nothing in the world to prevent the successful execution of these plans, once the United States navy has been rendered hors de combat on either coast.

Only the navy stands between these cities and their occupation by the enemy, with resultant extraction from them of millions and perhaps even billions in wealth. Once the city is in the hands of the invader, it is pointed out, the banks, stores, and factories are as helpless as a newborn babe in its cradle.

Could Easily Capture Guns. None of the guns in our coast defenses can be turned against an enemy approaching on the land side to capture them.

Mr. Roosevelt has never been in Japan, but he has been in Germany and elsewhere in Europe. It is not known here where he saw the plans he speaks of, but it is suggested as a possibility that he might have seen them in Europe.

Our military and naval attaches are frequently digging up abroad matter which they are satisfied, represents the plans of this nation or that in case of war with the United States.

Says German Submarine Sunk French Refugee Ship

Paris, Oct. 31.—The French official naval gazette says the German submarine, from which 1,200 refugees were rescued when it was sunk in the North Sea, did not strike a mine. The ship was torpedoed by a German submarine, says the gazette, contrary to the laws of war.

200 Die by Steel in Charge of Dragoons

Paris, Oct. 31.—It is officially announced that during a French attack upon a village held by a strong force of German artillery and infantry, the Second Regiment of French Dragoons, on foot, stormed the enemy's position with lances, killing 200 Germans and wounding 200 more.

Ysaie Escapes War Zone

London, Oct. 31.—Among the refugees from Belgium who arrived today were Ysaie, the violin virtuoso, and his family. They were forced to leave their home in the suburbs of Brussels through lack of food supplies.


