OLD DUTCH MARKET

WOMEN DROP SOCIAL DUTIES.
 Many Cancel Engagements to Aid Belgian Relief Committee.

Two scores of prominent society women yesterday decided to cancel all social engagements in order that they may aid in keeping open the headquarters of the Belgian Relief Committee in Washington, organized by Mrs. John A. Logan, and receive contributions of food and clothing for the relief of the women and children of Belgium.

The headquarters of the committee has been established in the Cripps Building, 65 Eleventh street northwest. Mrs. Alexander F. Moore contributed the free use of the building. Howard S. Resende aided in putting in gas and furnished two gas heating stoves and a gas range that the workers may keep warm and cook their own meals during the fifteen hours each day the offices will be open. J. Maury Dove contributed coal and W. B. Moore furnished chairs and tables. The committee already has raised \$25 in cash and a quantity of food and clothing. Mrs. C. M. Foulke, mother of Mrs. Havenly, wife of the Belgian Minister, and forty other women already have joined the committee.

Eight Hurt in Lehigh Wreck.
 West Run, Pa., Nov. 12.—Eight persons were injured when Lehigh Valley passenger train No. 2, Buffalo to New York, was derailed seven miles east of White Haven, Pa., near here, at 6:45 this morning. CHARGE UNEQUAL ACTION.
 Britain Says Ecuador and Colombia Have Aided Germans.

Acknowledgment was made at the State Department yesterday that Great Britain had called to the attention of the government alleged unequal action made of the territories of Ecuador and Colombia, as was pointed out in The Herald. The State Department will do nothing until the British government presents evidence in support of her charges. It is not known here whether the London foreign office is sending forward the details of the information in its possession. Thus far the British government has merely stated that it had information leading it to believe that radio stations in Colombia and Ecuador were being used to aid German warships in the Pacific, and that German cruisers were using the Galapagos Islands as a base.

Should the British carry the matter further, a serious and delicate issue will be presented to the United States government.

Secretary Bryan said yesterday that the Ecuadorian Legation had assured him that it was confident the Ecuadorian government had not permitted any violation of its neutrality.

CO-OPERATE WITH PRAEGER.
 Poultry Men Planning to Use Medium of Parcel Post.

Plans to co-operate with Postmaster Praeger in bringing the producer and consumer into closer touch through the medium of the parcel post were prepared by the National Capital Poultry Association, at a special meeting in the Public Library, last night. LABOR BANK PROPOSED OFFICERS DESIRE MORE

Mine Workers Want His Allowance of \$144,000,000 Called for by Estimates for Next Year.

Discus Toilers' Conditions at Europe's Peace Meeting.

Philadelphia, Nov. 12.—Col. Roosevelt's resolute method of compelling the Pennsylvania coal operators to settle the big miners' strike of 1912 is urged upon President Wilson by only one of the most distinguished of the Colorado mine owners in a formal resolution submitted to the convention of the American Federation of Labor today by the United Mine Workers.

They recite, first, the history of the Colorado mine owners and the support from the State, national and Congressional committees of investigation, which all agreed that the civil war conditions created in the State and country officials, and that "camp marshals whose appointments were dictated and whose salaries were paid by the coal companies have established arbitrary and illegal control over the miners and their rights and liberties."

Like "Big Stick" Methods.

The United Mine Workers further report the efforts made by President Wilson to settle the Colorado mining troubles and the defiance with which the Colorado mine owners have refused to consider any settlement proposals advanced by the President of the United States. As a result of Col. Roosevelt's "big stick" policy, which settled the 1902 strike.

Second in importance to the miners' resolution, one introduced by Samuel Gompers, the head of the federation, reciting at length the suffering brought on the working classes by war, his resolution says:

"That the convention of the American Federation of Labor, in view of the peace congress which no doubt will be held at the present time for the purpose of adjusting claims and differences, hold itself in readiness and authorize the executive council to call a meeting of representatives of labor of the different nations to meet at the same time and place, to the end that suggestions may be made and such action taken as shall be helpful in restoring fraternal relations, protecting the interest of the toilers and thereby assisting in laying foundations for a more lasting peace."

Wants Union Labor Bank.

Other resolutions brought in today referred to jurisdiction disputes and proposed boycotts against firms charged with being in violation of one resolution introduced by the Structural Iron Workers proposed the formation of a national union labor bank for all national and international unions dependent on the United States.

Addresses by fraternal delegates from ministerial bodies brought a vigorous reply from President Gompers at this point in the convention. He thanked the fraternal delegates for their expressions of good will, but in a vigorous and somewhat sarcastic address, he said that he was surprised and stirred the delegates to tremendous enthusiasm.

"I have in quiet and order," said Mr. Gompers, "and I will go to as great lengths as any man in promoting peace and tranquility. But there comes a time when it is necessary to remain in tranquility to rive the chains of slavery and oppression."

ever, are perfectly willing to stand it, for the idea of Washington having representatives in both Houses of Congress vote on such humanitarian measures as the abolition of slavery and the right of suffrage to all citizens is a thing which they would not have been insulted. Representative Mann only recently has said that he favored suffrage and if the women of this country haven't done anything else they have accomplished a great deal by smoking out the leader of the minority."

Will Cement Floor.

"The effect of the blacklist was disastrous in our State. Senator Lodge's name led the list and the next morning every Boston paper said at the top of the front page: 'Suffragists Blacklist Senator Lodge.' It cost us the suffrage plank in the Republican platform and will delay our getting an amendment to the State constitution for I do not know how long."

Delegates from Massachusetts, New York, Connecticut, Ohio and many other States spoke for the blacklist. Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, president of the association, addressed the delegates.

"The trouble with the blacklist is not that it has been made public, these things, but that we have made it public," said Dr. Shaw. "If they are proud of their records they ought to be glad that it has been made public. There has never been such work done in all our history as Mrs. McCormick and Mrs. Funk and Mrs. Sherman Booth have done at Washington. It is time we made these men in Congress responsible to their constituents. Let us stand up for our rights."

At the session tonight the delegates were welcomed by Governor Hooper. He is an anti-suffrage, but he assured his audience that "the State women were surely coming in every State of the Union."

Suffers Lapse of Memory.

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KAISER PROMISES WILSON NOT TO BOMBARD TWO FRENCH INDUSTRIAL TOWNS, IS REPORT

Paris, Nov. 12.—According to a Temps correspondent, the German government has promised the United States not to damage the important industrial towns of Rubaix and Tourcoing.

A captured German officer admits he had received orders to spare these towns. On the other hand, factories in the neighboring town of Armentieres have been systematically destroyed by shell fire and the great industrial center also has been destroyed.
