DEATH OF GARFIELD

Family Is Reunited After Many Years of Estrangement. MAY HAVE LOST FORTUNE

Special to The Washington Herald. New York, Dec. 12.—The sudden death of Richard A. Canfield, has reunited the family after many years of estrangement. Mrs. Genevieve Canfield, wife of the dead gambler, arrived here today from Providence to complete arrangements for the funeral.

WON LIVING BY CARDS

Canfield, who was the chief of New York gamblers until William Travers Jerome, then district attorney, declared war upon him, was born in Providence fifty-nine years ago. There he received a common school education, and as a young man started to win his living with cards.

His first venture in New York was in Fifty-sixth street. It was not long before New York learned that his play was quiet and safe, and "square," and that if one was really insistent the limit could be raised. Canfield was inclined to luxury, he had some taste for art and ceramics, and his reputation in these lines was secure when he decided to move uptown, to the house in East Forty-fourth street next to Belmont's. The recent speedily became the most famous gambling house in New York.

The vase, taken as a souvenir by one of the raiders, for a long time rested on the mantel of a Mott street tenement, described by its possessor as the "most beautiful" that the city had ever seen.
