Joseph Andre Tressi Will Produce a Comic Opera Early in February.

Joseph Andre Tressi, who conducted here for the Aborn Opera Company last spring at the National Theater, and who is most favorably known in musical circles all over the States, as well as Europe and South Africa, has opened a studio for vocal culture and singing at Highland Terrace, 1407 Massachusetts avenue northwest. Mr. Tressi was for eight years director and principal singing leader of the South African College of Music, Johannesburg, and has conducted in this country for the Strakosch, Graw, Savage, Aborn and other big opera companies, both grand and comic, and is eminently fitted to teach voice production and especially fit ladies and gentlemen for the concert and operatic stage. He is starting at once an operatic club for the production of a comic opera on the local stage early in February. He invites ladies and gentlemen with good voices to join this class, even if they are not his own pupils. By the way, the opera composed by Mr. Tressi, entitled "A Chinese Romance," was produced here about ten years ago at the then Lafayette Square Theater, when the newspapers said the music was equal to any of De Koven's and Sousa's best.

SCHOOL LEGALIZES "HAZING."

But Syracuse Board Declares It Must Be Held Within Limits. Syracuse, N. Y., Dec. 7.—Legalized hazing at Syracuse University will support the indiscriminate practice of this feature of college life, according to a decision reached by the senior council at its meeting this morning, when thirty sophomores were placed in strict probation for their part in recent alleged hazing, at which several victims were injured. So far as is known this is the first time in the history of American universities that this innovation has been attempted.

ONE NATION HALTS TRUCE.

Vatican Announces Failure of Pope's Christmas Proposal. By BRINGTON D. ALLLAIRE. Rome, Dec. 12.—The efforts of Pope Benedict XV to obtain a truce in the European war during the Christmas season have failed. This was announced at the Vatican today in a public document which says that "owing to the opposition of a certain power," efforts to stay hostilities over Christmas have come to naught.

DETECT LEAD BY TELEPHONE.

New Device Successful in French Red Cross Hospitals. Paris, Dec. 12.—Shrapnel diving by telephone is being practiced in the military hospitals. The apparatus used is the Hughes balance, consisting of two electrical reels to which an ordinary telephone is attached. The reels are run over the body of the wounded patient and the telephone buzzes when the reel passes over a hidden bullet or fragment of shell.

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
