

SAN DIEGO EXHIBITION IS IN FULL SWING

Grounds Show Many Beauties of Nature as Well as Handicraft.

MARINES CAMPED THERE

Delegates from Many Nations Were Present When President Wilson Formally Opened Grounds.

San Diego, Cal., Jan. 4.—With the formal opening on New Year's Eve, the Panama-California Exposition here is now in full swing.

During the last three weeks displays poured into San Diego in a steady stream, and out of the apparatus chaos, there came order, and the San Diego Exposition stands complete.

Among the exhibits added during the last month was one of the apparatus craft, which had been planned in the Foreign and Domestic Arts Building.

In accordance with the San Diego Exposition's doctrine of showing the best of the world, native Mexicans are at work in the exhibit making the different articles which are on display.

There are rugs, pottery, articles of silver, horse-hair tapestries and harness, and many other products of Mexican handicraft. These are being made from designs hundreds and even thousands of years old, some far antedating the coming of the earliest Spanish explorers.

Four companies of United States marines, together with the Regimental Marine Band, are camped on the exposition grounds, where they will remain during the entire year.

Rosecrans, a short distance from the grounds, is the Thirteenth Regiment Coast Artillery Band, which also will play on the exposition grounds during 1915.

The band's official costumes are Spanish.

San Diego Beautiful.

The walls and over the corners of the great Spanish colonial exposition buildings cluster beautiful roses, white flowers, shrubbery, and trees grow in profusion throughout the grounds.

While the north and east sides in cold winds and snowdrifts, Southern California is bright and sunny.

Invitations Received from Many. Asking President to Stop on Panama-Pacific Trip.

President Wilson's return trip from the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco will be full of collection of stopovers if he accepts half of the invitations that are pouring in upon his desk for consideration.

"Bids" for visits in various States were made by Senators and Congressmen yesterday. There is a demand for his appearance at nearly all the larger cities on his route across the continent.

The President will leave Washington for the Canal Zone about the middle of March, according to present plans.

At Norfolk he will board the battleship New York and join the main Atlantic fleet off Norfolk.

At San Francisco, he will board the Oregon, whose sensational dash around the Horn in the Spanish-American war so emphasized the necessity for the canal, and will pass through the big ditch on that vessel.

The ceremonies at Panama will last three days. President Wilson paying his respects to the president of Panama. He will then return to the New York and complete the trip to San Francisco, stopping en route to visit the Panama Canal.

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LOCAL BROKERS INDICTED AGAIN

Grand Jury Returns Three New Bills Against Henry and Woodruff.

MRS. GRACIE COMPLAINS Charges Embezzlement Against Members of Bank Firm—C. M. Fulton Named in Another Bill.

Three additional indictments growing out of the failure of Lewis Johnson & Co., brokers, were returned by the grand jury yesterday.

Two were against J. William Henry and Benjamin W. Woodruff, who comprised the bankrupt firm, charging embezzlement and larceny after trust. The third bill was against J. William Henry, charging that he converted 20 shares of Pacific Coast Company to his own use.

Mrs. Constance S. Gracie is complainant in the indictments. In the first joint indictment both members of the firm are charged with embezzlement and larceny of stock belonging to Mrs. Gracie and valued at \$15,500.

In the second joint indictment it is alleged both men appropriated to their own use the stock of a check drawn by the firm by Mrs. Gracie to buy fifty shares of United Fruit Company stock.

Give New Bonds. Henry and Woodruff, now out on bond for indictments returned against them December 22, gave additional bond for their appearance in court.

The grand jury returned other indictments as follows: First degree murder, Lawrence Robinson and Joseph Hawkins; violations of opium law, Lee You and Moy You; blackmail, Walter L. Rhine; larceny of goods, John C. Woodruff, Jr. and Wesley Beall and Nelson W. Washington; assault with a dangerous weapon, George R. Chinn; libel, Sydney W. Langford; grand larceny and robbery, Emanuel Pope; arson, Thomas Jackson; forgery, William W. Dewitt; robbery, Marnie Williams; assault with a dangerous weapon, John C. Woodruff, Jr. and Wesley Beall; and embezzlement, C. M. Fulton, Charles Rayfield, Charles E. Holmes, and Henry Green.

BERLIN ADMITS FRENCH SUCCESSES IN ALSACE

British Battleship Formidable Sunk by Teuton Submarine Which Escaped Unhurt, Admiralty Announces.

Berlin, Jan. 4. (By wireless)—French successes in Alsace admitted in an official report given out at main army headquarters today.

"In the western theater," says the report, "it is generally quiet except for artillery combats near Verdun and heavy fighting in the Argonne region. Only about Thann and Aubers have the enemy showed great activity.

An overwhelming bombardment of the heights west of Soissons, the enemy occupied our demolished trenches. The enemy took the heights and villages around Stenbach.

Official announcement that the British battleship Formidable was torpedoed by a German submarine was made today. The submarine was sunk by British destroyers, but escaped undamaged.

KAHN OUTLINES PLAN FOR ARMY RESERVE

Representative from California Addresses Spanish War Veterans at Installation Exercises.

The question of national defense must hold the interest of every patriot, Representative Kahn, of California, said last night at a meeting of the District of Columbia Spanish War Veterans at Pythian Temple, where officers of the order were installed.

"We are particularly weak in the matter of reserves," said Representative Kahn. "I would make the maximum enlistment two years for artillerymen, eighteen months for cavalrymen, and one year for infantrymen. That way we could turn out thousands each year who would be effective reservists."

Installation ceremonies were conducted by Department Commander Henry C. Wilson, who was accompanied by the following staff: Col. Charles A. Williams, senior vice commander; J. Q. A. Braden, junior vice commander; Lee H. Harris, inspector; Jere A. Chaplin, judge advocate; Dr. Samuel L. Hanson, surgeon; William I. Temple, where officers of the order were installed.

The woman had not suffered any ill effects without operating. It proved to be a reptile commonly known as the grass snake, nearly pure white. The hospital authorities refuse to make any statement regarding the case.
