Carranza Representatives
Leave on Delicate
Mission.

U. S. MAY SHIFT SILLIMAN

Sahlilo Falls to Gutierrez. Former
President—Famine and Epidemic
Threaten Capital.

Charles A. Douglas, Washington counsel for Carranza, and Eliseo Arredondo, head of the Carranza agency, left for Vera Cruz yesterday to consult with the first chief.

One of the chief purposes of the journey is to convey to Carranza something of the Washington view of some of the acts of his government. Washington representatives of Carranza have found it difficult to defend the wisdom or good judgment of many acts of Carranza since his break with the Villa faction, and it is no secret that the administration here has been considerably irritated by his policies.

Secretary of State Bryan announced yesterday that Consul Silliman would probably be sent to Vera Cruz to be near the Carranza government, and it is thought probable that other governments will make similar arrangements for dealing with Carranza without having their ministers follow him to Vera Cruz.

Consul Silliman yesterday cabled the State Department that certain sections of the city "reek with filth and disease." Medical authorities, with limited supplies, are trying to check an epidemic. Gen. Obregon, the military commander, is making an effort to drive out the Zapatistas who control the main water supply from their positions in the suburbs of the capital.

Occupation of Sahlilo by a large force of Carranzistas, commanded by Gen. Eulalio Gutierrez, former provisional president, was announced yesterday by Eliseo Arredondo, Gen. Carranza's agent here.

Gen. Francisco Villa, through his confidential agent, Senor Enrique Lorente, here, yesterday addressed a note to ministers and ambassadors of foreign governments having diplomatic representatives in Mexico City, inviting the envoys to join Gen. Villa in the fight against the Carranzistas.

Britons Fear Invasion; Martial Law Declared

Officials Get Hint that Germans Will
Make Dash on Coast in Effort
to Land Troops.

London, Feb. 17.—Anticipating a possible attempt by the Germans to land troops on the coast, the British government has issued orders that civilians must obey all orders given by the military authorities. They are warned not to take part in any fighting unless members of volunteer corps.

While only the main points of the government order are known here, it is said that word has been received that the Germans will attempt to land troops upon the coast from a number of ships.

HONEYMOONERS RIDE
RODS ON FAST FREIGHT

Another Kick on High Cost of Mar-
riage and Third Pair Find It's a
Long Way to Matrimony.

Ashtabula, Ohio, Feb. 17.—The police today took William Burn, twenty-one years old, and his bride, twenty years old, from the blind baggage of an express train on which the girl, dressed as a man, was trying to get back to Niagara Falls from Cleveland, where they had gone "travelling."

The discovery was due to a fight in which Burn engaged three tramps on the train in an effort to protect his bride. The police saw the girl, the battle and dragged the quintet from the train at the New York Central Station here.

The couple were married three weeks ago in Niagara Falls, their home. Burn had \$24, but no work. They went to Erie, Pa., where he spent his money making work in vain. Then the girl pawned her jewelry for money to go to Cleveland, where Burn again sought work, but failed.

Today Burn, desperate, traded his overcoat for a pair of trousers, cut his bride's hair, tugged her in the trousers and they boarded a fast train bound for Buffalo. Ashtabula citizens raised enough money to send them home.

New York, Feb. 17.—The high cost of getting married at city hall was brought to the attention of Mayor Mitchell yesterday, when he received this letter:

"Hon. Mayor: I was married by the city hall last week day and some fat man, I guess he is the alderman, made me give him \$5. I thought poor people get married for nothing by the city hall. When I told the alderman I only had \$5 with me he called me a liar, and to borrow \$3 from my wife for this stick up. You should look those crooks over. They are dirty loafers, Mr. Mayor."

The letter, it should be stated, bore the date of St. Valentine's Day. Incidentally, aldermen are not supposed to charge for performing marriages, ceremonies, but their "runners" frequently get substantial fees.

Kearney, N. J., Feb. 17.—Young Joseph McNally has been in bed for forty-eight hours, not because he needs a doctor, but because his mother has hidden all his clothes to keep him from eloping again with fifteen-year-old Janet McVittie. Joseph is seventeen.

The couple eloped to Newark in a box car after Sunday school last Sunday, where they spent many hours trying in vain to find somebody to marry them. There were two reasons why they didn't succeed. One was they were too young. The other was they didn't have any money to buy a license. A Newark policeman found the pair standing on a corner with Joseph trying to kiss Janet. Janet was crying because she said she was "tired and hungry and wished she was home."

Janet lives with her uncle, Henry Crookall, a wealthy retired contractor, but for the present she has been sent to Trenton, where she will have to take her infatuation for Joseph out in thinking.
