MORE MARINES TO GO TO HAITI

Force of 850 Will Leave Philadelphia Early Next Week.

PORT OFFICE IS TAKEN

Naval Forces Also Seize National Palace at Port au Prince—One Haitian Killed.

On the request of Rear Admiral Caperton, commanding the American forces operating in Haiti, 850 additional marines will be sent to Port au Prince at once. This will make the total force of marines in Haiti about 1,500.

This force will leave early next week from Philadelphia, under command of Col. L. W. T. Waller, one of the most experienced and able officers of the Marine Corps. The marines will go on the armored cruiser Tennessee, which is now coaling at New York.

It is likely the Tennessee will remain in Haitian waters some time, as Admiral Caperton is being compelled to split his forces into number of detachments, and needs a number of vessels to act as transports and to observe the situation in the various cities on the coast of Haiti.

Tug Sent to Seize. Thursday, on news of an outbreak at Gonaves, one of the principal ports of Haiti, the admiral sent the tug Osceola to the scene with a small detachment of marines. The tug was to be used to protect the custom house at Gonaves, if necessary. It is expected this port will be taken over just as Port au Prince and Cape Haitien have been occupied by the American forces.

While Admiral Caperton rapidly is strengthening his hold on the situation in Haiti, it was indicated yesterday that the time is fast approaching when the administration at Washington must give his some instructions as to policy on the political side of the problem. It has been announced in Port au Prince that the Haitian congress will meet Sunday to elect a president. It is not at all certain the administration will consider it desirable that a new president be chosen just at this time, and it is possible it will be decided that steps be taken to postpone this action by the Haitians.

U. S. Takes Port and Palace. Port au Prince, Aug. 6.—United States naval forces under Admiral Caperton today took possession of the National Palace and the office of the port and seized the Haitian gunboat Pacific, which arrived from Cape Haytien this morning. The gunboat was disarmed and landed. They were greeted on shore by a crowd which cried, "Hurrah for Robo!"

During the operation to take possession of the port office the American troops were forced to fire, and one Haitian was killed. A woman also was wounded. The incident has caused a great stir in the town. Gen. Robo arrived this afternoon on the Celtic from Cape Haitien and went to his chambers, where he immediately initiated a protest against the American occupation.

The occupation is being extended not only to the palace, the fort and all other important places in the town, but three miles beyond the limits. American patrols are in the streets maintaining peace and order, and tonight the curfew law forbidding persons without authority to pass through the streets after 8 o'clock was put into force.

The U. S. S. Connecticut landed 150 marines, who occupied the forts. The committee of public safety nominally headed by Robo has been dissolved, and at a meeting today of the commanders of the Connecticut and Nashville with prominent members of the committee, new committee were discussed, but none has been named as yet. A meeting has been called for Sunday to elect a president.

Government Watchman Dead. Stricken in the morning with heart disease at the Government Printing Office, where he was employed as a watchman, Thomas J. Stratford, 70 New Jersey avenue northwest, died Thursday night at Casualty Hospital, Claude Stratford, of Follansbee, W. Va., son of the deceased, is arranging for the funeral.

Says Neutrals Ask Peace Parley. Amsterdam (via London), Aug. 6.—It is learned from The Hague that the anti-war council there has been privately informed by certain neutral governments that they were ready to convene a permanent peace conference to be composed of special representatives from each country.

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POPE PLANS NEW MOVE IN INTEREST OF PEACE Will Ask Co-operation of Neutral Countries in Document Soon to Be Issued.

Rome, Aug. 6.—The Pope is about to take a new step in favor of cessation of hostilities. The Corriere d'Italia says today: "The Pope continues to work for peace that shall be just and shall respect the rights of nations. He does not speak as an advocate of this or that people, or even as an advocate of the Italian people; his voice should resound as a solemn admonition to all who today seek to impose a peace without having regard for the rights and just aspirations of oppressed peoples."

Bank Clearings Show Big Gain. New York, Aug. 6.—Bank clearings in the United States for the week ending August 5 aggregated \$2,402,820,000 against \$2,023,570,000 last week and \$2,361,827,000 in this week last year.

COMPANY TO DISSOLVE OR BE REORGANIZED Alternatives Presented to Stockholders of National Capital Life Insurance Company.

Superintendent of Insurance Nesbit recently halted the operations of the company, demanding that methods be changed.

DYNAMITE FOUND ON ARABIC BEFORE TRIP Slightest Jar Would Have Set Off High Explosive, Say New York Police.

New York, Aug. 6.—Despite previous denials of the report, it was finally learned at police headquarters today that two sticks of dynamite, weighing about half a pound, and in such condition of deterioration that the slightest jar might easily have exploded them, were found in one of the women's rooms of the White Star liner Arabic shortly before she sailed from this port for Liverpool early in July 18. A thorough search was made at the time, and no more dynamite was found, and the safe arrival of the ship at Liverpool today has been reported to the New York office of the line.
