New York, Aug. 10.—With Col. Eduardo N. Iturbide, one of the foremost citizens of Mexico, as their leader, a large number of prominent Mexicans have united to assist in the efforts of the United States and South American representatives to restore order in that war-torn country and to establish a stable government. Conferences were held all day in anticipation of the meeting tomorrow of pan-American diplomats with Secretary of State Lansing at the Hotel Hamilton in New York.

Their general plan is to unite into a liberal progressive party all the intelligent classes of Mexico and to form a group that shall be neither like the old Liberal Unionists nor the one hand nor the factional revolutionists on the other.

"I am desirous of co-operating with the United States and with the United States myself," said Col. Iturbide at his office, 21 State street. "The principle object of myself and my associates is to get into power in Mexico the best representatives of the social forces of Mexico with a very well defined plan of agrarian reform.

These same diplomats are understood to favor the general plan proposed by Col. Iturbide and his associates, and are opposed to recognition of any of the factional leaders or their dummies.

Col. Iturbide comes of one of the most prominent families of Mexico. After the fall of Huerta he was twice called by the people of the City of Mexico to assume supreme control of the capital during periods of disorder. Finally, he was elected to the office of mayor of the city. He has gathered around him a large number of substantial business men, and representatives of the intelligent minority, who are friends of the great mass of lowly people and have very definite plans for distribution of land and their amelioration.
