Griffith Buys New First Baseman from Buffalo--Nationals Deaten

Rally in Eighth Inning Wins Game for Boston

Walter Johnson Batted Hard in Spots by the League Leaders--Score, 4-3.

RUTH IS A BIG PUZZLE

Red Sox Southpaw Has All the Best of Pitching Duel at Fenway Park.

By PAUL H. SHANNON, Baseball Expert of the Boston Post. Boston, Aug. 14--For several anxious innings the Nationals seemed fated to win their first game of the season at Fenwick Park this afternoon, and with a two-run margin to work upon and the great Walter Johnson in the box...

Ruth Outpitches Johnson. It was a battle between the David and Goliath of the American League hurlers today, for Babe Ruth, youngest and most erratic of Carrigan's hurlers, was opposed in what turned out to be a great pitching duel to Johnson, on whom the Griffen confidently banked for victory.

But for a bad decision by Umpire Wallace Ruth would have had a shut-out, for the three runs the Nationals scored in the third were secured after Foster had been fairly struck out. Although this incompetent official did not see that way, Foster's hit followed, letting one run count, and then Speaker's overthrow aided in tallying Moeller, in spite of the barefaced interference at the plate that Wallace chose not to see.

Griffen Not Dangerous. Three of the Nationals' five hits aided in attaining the three scores they made in this round. Never afterward were they dangerous. But the superb backing up that Walter Johnson received forced the Red Sox to win every one of their four tallies, and no alibi is possible in the Washington nine-inning battle.

Hobby's Fly Does It. Scott sacrificed and moved both runners up, but walked him (purpose). Then Hobbitt fled to Milan, and after a great sprint Ruth crossed the plate with the run that gave Boston the lead. Lewis made the greatest play ever seen at Fenwick Park, when, in the seventh, he raced into the left field corner and pulled down Gardner's terrific drive with one hand while running at top speed.
