Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 27.—After defeating Indianapolis this morning in a sensational game, Washington threw the second game away to St. Louis in the wildest game of the tournament, and the Missourians carried off the championship in the Union Printers National Baseball League, which finished its series on the Strawbridge and Clothier field today.


