JOHNSTON AND GRIFFIN WIN TENNIS DOUBLES

Maurice McLoughlin and Thomas C. Bundy Are Beaten in National Championship.

New York, Sept. 8.—For the first time in his famed career Maurice E. McLoughlin entered a tennis match at Forest Hills today with the opposition picked to win by the public that was always his—a public that ionized him after his wins over Wilding and Brookes in the last Davis Cup matches, and still ionize him for his stout-heartedness.

And for the first time since 1912, when he and Thomas C. Bundy wrested the national doubles championship from Raymond D. Little and Gustav E. Touchard, McLoughlin and his partner were defeated. They were defeated by William M. Johnston and Clarence J. Griffin. The score was 2-6, 4-3, 4-6, 6-3.

And what a match it was. It is true that it did not measure to the sensational match between McLoughlin and Johnston of yesterday, but it was a match in the history of American tennis or international tennis ever approximated that wonderful contest for spine-chilling thrills and sensational results.

This was not to be expected of today's match, and because of this the whole-hearted efforts of the players did not lead to an entirely unexciting contest on Tuesday. Yet it was tennis of an extraordinary sort, it had to be with the 29-year-old Johnston and the 26-year-old Griffin, too, did their share to make this the last match of the thirty-fifth annual tournament of the United States National Lawn Tennis Association at Forest Hills.
