RUSSIAN LEFT WING ALREADY IN RETREAT

Behind Withdrawing Forces Smolensk and Kiev Evacuation Orders Are Being Enforced.

Petrograd, Sept. 11.—While fierce attacks by the Russian troops have given them marked successes in Galicia, it became known today that the present line held by the army of Gen. Ivanoff will be abandoned. The main forces of the Russian left wing are already executing a retrograde movement.

Behind this front large industrial centers such as Kiev and Smolensk are being cleared of their civilian population. It is apparent that the Russian general staff anticipates continuation of the German campaign through the fall, though this will necessarily slow up the gains increase in violence.

The evacuation of Kiev began last Tuesday and of Smolensk the following day. The order for the departure of civilians was not given in the belief that either city would soon be taken by the Teutonic troops, but in order to turn over the resources of both to the military establishment.

Orders for 100,000 tunics for the Russian army have been placed with Leeds firms.

'WIFE' OF RICH MAN'S SON DIES IN CRASH

Accident in Auto Reveals New York's Companion Was Wife of Another.

Binghamton, N. Y., Sept. 11.—When Austin W. Darling, a prominent merchant of this city, was taken to the sheriff's office under arrest today the fact became public that Mrs. Margaret A. Dickinson, while posing as his wife, had been killed when his automobile plunged over an eight-foot embankment near Windsor.

Mrs. Dickinson was the young and attractive wife of Alton G. Dickinson, a conductor on the Delaware and Hudson Railroad, who is absent from his home here on the trip. Mr. Darling is a nephew of one of the city's most prominent citizens, formerly president of the common council, and son of a wealthy man.

Mr. Darling and Mrs. Dickinson left this city Wednesday night in his father's automobile and started east on the Southern New York Highway. Between this city and Harrisville they had engine trouble and had to stop. A man named Wingo, living near where they stopped, said there in their car, the engine died and the car rolled into a ditch.

These drove on with a crippled automobile and were not heard of again until after 2 o'clock Thursday morning, when Mr. Darling awakened several farmers near Windsor, telling them that his automobile had gone over an embankment and that his wife had been killed.

Mr. Darling refused to give his name to the farmers, but the number of his automobile was found to be that of his father, and word was telegraphed here.

Leader of Esperantists Safe.

The Esperanto society asked the department to locate Dr. Zamiatoff whereabouts, as it was found he was lost in the war zone. Merchants Go on Trade Boosting Trip Early Tomorrow Morning

Never in the history of the National Capital has so stupendous an advertising effort been put forward in the interest of the city as is contemplated in the automobile trade boosting trip of the Retail Merchants' Association, which will leave Washington tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock.

Every element that enters into the arrangement for the outing has been organized on a big scale. At least 2,000 pieces of advertising matter will be carried for distribution in the thirty-two towns to be visited in Maryland, West Virginia and Virginia.

The slogan that will meet the out-of-town brethren is "Save Money—Buy in Washington." This is carried out in the banners with which the cars will be decorated and in the special newspaper edition of which 20,000 copies will be distributed in the thirty-two towns and cities to be visited.

The start is to be made from in front of the headquarters of the association, 1101 Pennsylvania avenue. The automobiles will be assembled at Eleventh street and Pennsylvania avenue northward at 7:30 o'clock, following which those who are to make the trip will gather in the association's headquarters to receive their seating assignments and automobile positions.

Promptly at 8 o'clock, led by a platoon of police and the merchants' band, the boosters will proceed west on Pennsylvania avenue to Fifteenth north on Fifteenth to the White House, north on Sixteenth to Massachusetts avenue, to Connecticut avenue, to Bradley lane, thence westward on Bradley lane to Wisconsin avenue, and then on out the pike to Rockville, at which place the first stop of the day will be made.

Other stops will be made at Gaithersburg, Newville, Cedar Grove, Damascus, Clonestown, Bridgeville, New Market, and Frederick. Dinner will be served at the City Hotel in Frederick at 1 o'clock. An opportunity will be given the boosters to circulate in the afternoon part of the advertising staff in Frederick County, the second richest county in the United States, the boosters will give this city special attention.
