INDIANS HUNT CANADIAN WOODS FOR MRS. GALT'S WEDDING FURS

Word has just been received here that the Blackfoot Indians of the Glacier National Park Reservation, Northeast Montana, are preparing to honor Mrs. Norman Galt, the fiancée of President Wilson and a descendant of Pocahontas, by making, as her wedding gift, what will probably be the most elaborate assortment of furs ever given to a single person.

This collection of furs will not be complete until the last of November or the first of December, it is thought. The best Indian represented in the collection is the Blackfoot, who has secured the nation's Horn sheep, elk four kinds of bear, a moose and weasel mink and marten.

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STARTS AERO FLIGHT FROM SHIP IN MOTION

First Launching of the Kind Successfully Made from United States Cruiser North Carolina.

The first launching of an aeroplane from the deck of a warship under way was reported to the Navy Department yesterday from the naval aviation school at Pensacola, Fla.

Leut. Commander H. C. Moustin, attached to the aviation school, made the successful flight from the cruiser North Carolina Friday. The feat is regarded by naval officers as culminating a series of experiments which began in 1912. So far as is known, no other nation has developed aeroplane launchings to the extent that has been done in the American navy. The launching device is in the form of a car, upon which the aeroplane is mounted for a flight. The car is propelled along a track on the deck of the ship, attaining a speed of about fifty miles an hour at the end of the track. When the car reaches the end of the track a device checks it and automatically releases the aeroplane which then flies off over the water under its own power.
