A defective young man wrote: "I am slightly handicapped, but I find life nothing but a struggle. What pleasure is life if you can't enjoy it?" "I am the mother of a defective daughter," wrote Mrs. Spencer, of Pittsburg, Pa.

When she was born we begged the doctor to save her. If she had died then, what a blessing it would have been."
