At the outset, however, he disclosed an impatience at the wide-spread disposition among educational leaders to regard the activities defined in the so-called extension work as being designed solely to carry out to the people of a State the impulses of progress which the State university is capable of originating. Its goal is something more than this, he said, comprehending not merely the extension of the university's usefulness to the people in outlying countries, but the enabling of the university, through a circulatory process of ideas, to gather into its own veins and arteries those finer impulses of the State which are necessary in order that the life of the State institution constitute a robust expression of the life of the State itself. Mr. Graham expressed the conviction that "the final establishment of university extension as an altogether true and worthy university function is inevitable, because it is fixed in the nature of the relation of the institution to the truly efficient democratic state."

**FAMOUS LENS MAKER WILL TALK ON STARS**  
 Dr. John A. Brashear to Address Local Society of Engineers on Astronomy.

Illustrated by a rare collection of stellar and other slides, including many taken in South America, an address entitled "An Evening Among the Stars" will be delivered tonight at Continental Memorial Hall by Dr. John A. Brashear, world's leading lensmaker and manufacturer of astronomical and physical instruments. The address will be given under auspices of the Washington Society of Engineers. Dr. Brashear is also noted throughout the country for his great work in education and philanthropy.

The advancement of astronomical knowledge through the work of Dr. Brashear includes the following things: Sun can be seen in broad daylight better than formerly by an eclipse expedition sent half around the world; drift of the solar system through space measured; stars of the seventeenth magnitude, instead of the seventh, measured; 200 new planets discovered, and the standard meter given an absolute value in something that can never be destroyed.

**PEACE SOCIETY HELPS TO FINANCE CONGRESS**  
 That the Pan-American Scientific Congress, now in session here, has been financed for the most part by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace became known for the first time yesterday. The congress has drawn the greatest thinkers of two continents to Washington and the traveling expenses and entertainment of about sixty of these delegates has been paid by the Carnegie fund. The expense to the United States government, so far, for the congress has been approximately \$35,000. More than \$100,000 has been spent by the government.

**DANIELS APPLIES "GAG" LAW TO NAVY OFFICERS**  
 Secretary Explains He Deems It Unwise for Officers to "Attempt to Influence Legislation."

Officers of the navy hereafter will not be permitted to "talk in public." The rule by which Secretary of War Garrison prohibited army officers from making speeches has been made applicable to navy officers.

This fact became known yesterday when Secretary Daniels wired John W. Scott, of the Chicago Commercial Club, that he would not give Rear Admiral Austin M. Knight permission to speak before that organization on January 15. The Commercial Club had asked Rear Admiral Bradley A. Fiske to speak, but Fiske wired he would not be able to do so.

"It is my conviction," said Secretary Daniels, "that the expert opinion of the Navy Department, having been given to the public and Congress, and the President having outlined a policy for naval construction, it is better for civilians to lead the fight for enlargement, while naval officers follow the unbroken policy of not attempting to influence legislation. Until I became Secretary of the Navy the reports of the General Board had been regarded as confidential."
