

# LOANS ADVANCE ON THE MARKET

## Almost Half Million Borrowed at Less Than Six Per Cent.

### WILL ERECT APARTMENT

#### Harry Wardman to Build Six-Story Fireproof House at Cost of About \$400,000.

Although three deals involving a total of \$50,000 were made last week, the closing days of the month fell short of the figures established earlier in the month. Schneider, as trustee.

# TO MAKE EFFORT TO WAKE CHURCH
