Kavaya, Near Durazzo, Falls to Austrians

Special Cable to The Washington Herald. London, Feb. 18.—Kavaya, eight miles southwest of Durazzo, the capital of Albania, has been captured by Austro-Hungarian troops assisted by Albanians.

The Austro-Hungarian headquarters, in making this announcement, adds that the garrison which was composed of Essad Pasha's gendarmes escaped capture by flight on board a ship.

By the capture of Kavaya, which is but three miles from the Adriatic, the Teutons have Durazzo nearly surrounded and its fall is inevitable.
