SAYS BORLAND WOULD UNDO LABOR REFORM CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE. forced to take the position that all legislation seeking to interfere in behalf of the employee in the interest of limited hours of labor is wrong; thus all the accomplishments in the direction of ameliorating the condition of labor in this country would be overturned, repudiated at the very fountain head.

Would Impair Efficiency. That far from increasing the efficiency in the government administrative machinery, the enactment of a minimum eight-hour workday would seriously impair the efficiency.

All Bureau Work Overtime. I quote from statements made to me by responsible officials of the various departments with respect to overtime requirements: Mr. Davis, chief clerk of the Department of State—"Practically every bureau has overtime work to do."

In 1915 a total overtime was recorded of 1,586 1/2 days, or 11,103 hours. This is not advanced as a complete record, as the understanding is that for short periods of overtime no report was made.

Mr. Curtis, chief clerk of the Navy Department: "I do not think the eight-hour minimum requirement would lessen the overtime very materially, as the overtime made by employees is necessitated at intervals and could not be handled in any other way than by overtime work on the days that the work comes in."

Mr. Haverner, chief clerk of the Department of Commerce: "The general amount of overtime made by the employees in this department, but there are several bureaus where the employees now average from eight to nine hours per day."

Mr. Ayres, chief clerk of the Interior Department: "Out of 4,000 employees in the Interior Department, 12 per cent put in overtime ranging from one to seven hours daily in 1915."

Mr. Reese, chief clerk of the Department of Agriculture: "Although I am unable to state the amount in figures, I am prepared to state that in every bureau of this department there is a large amount of overtime put in by our employees."

CITIZENS JOIN CLERKS' BATTLE Central Association Denounces Borland Amendment for Long Work Day. QUILTS THE FEDERATION Committee Appointed to Work for Organization of New Central Body.

The Borland amendment, to make all government clerks in the District work eight hours a day, was denounced by the Central Citizens' Association at a meeting in the North Capitol Savings Bank last night.

The statement of Andrew Wilson, president of the Anti-Saloon League, before the subcommittee of the Senate District Committee several weeks ago, to the effect that the neighborhood surrounding the Government Printing Office was a "slum section" was resented by the association in the motion of Leo A. Rover a resolution was adopted characterizing Mr. Wilson's utterances as language "unwise, unfair and insulting to all right-thinking citizens."

AUTO MAN IS FOUND SHOT BY ROADSIDE Walter L. Smith Has Good Chance of Recovery From Bullet Wound. Say Hospital Physicians.

Walter L. Smith, 22 Georgetown University law graduate and son of U. Grant Smith, private secretary to the Secretary of the Department of Commerce was found seriously wounded at the roadside in a Conduit highway above Cabin John's Bridge yesterday by Sheriff R. G. Gates, of Maryland. A bullet had crashed through the roof of his mouth and lodged near the base of his brain.
