LANE PRAISES FEATS

For the first feature, President Willard, of the American Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company, called points in every part of the United States over the long distance telephone. Each of the 700 guests was supplied with a telephone receiver.



by the mediators were signed yesterday by the four committees and attested by the Commissioners, exactly forty-eight hours after the call for a conference was issued Sunday by the Commissioners.

The agreement was signed by President King, Vice President Ham and Superintendent of Transportation Moffett for the company, and G. A. Wilburt, Harry A. Jones and F. W. Thompson for the employees of the Washington Railway and Electric Company, and President Hamilton, Vice President Carl and Superintendent of Transportation Hanna for the company, and H. L. White, J. H. Cookman and J. L. Gattner for the employees of the Capital Traction Company.

Officers and employees left the building together, thanking the Commissioners for their effort in bringing about a working agreement.

The Commissioners announced after the preliminary meeting yesterday that the issues were now entirely up to the committees, the matter being settled satisfactorily so far as they were concerned.

Wilson Told of Settlement.

President Wilson was informed at yesterday's Cabinet meeting by Secretary of Labor Wilson of the plans for arbitration of the dispute.

The reinstatement of employees who have been discharged since February 14 is the first issue considered by the arbitrators. It is alleged these men were discharged because of their affiliation with the newly organized union. Approximately fifty men are involved in this issue.

The second question will be the reduction of hours from twelve and thirteen, as now existing, to ten hours a day. The third question will be the increase of wage to a flat rate of 30 cents per hour instead of the graduated scale now existing.

From statements made by the officials of the company, it is expected that if the increase of wage is granted they will insist upon the abolition of the present system of bonuses, relief plans and profit sharing.

WILSON AND STONE MEET.

Conference at White House Supposed to Refer to Foreign Tangle.

President Wilson conferred with Senator Stone, of Missouri, chairman of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations at the White House last night. After the conference Mr. Stone refused to indicate the subject he had discussed with the President and White House officials were equally reticent. Officials, however, were confident that last night's conference related to the situation in some way.

It is understood that Senator Stone will not deliver the speech on the right of Americans to travel on armed merchantmen of belligerents which he prepared last week and gave notice he would deliver in a few days.

Negro Stabbed to Death.

Charles Brooks, colored, 28, was stabbed to death early yesterday in a fight at New York and New Jersey avenues. The killing was about a half block from quarters of No. 4 Fire Truck Company, firemen of which were alerted by passersby who found Brooks unconscious. Brooks died in an ambulance on the way to Casualty Hospital. Police of the Second precinct arrested Herman Lee, colored, 24, for the murder.

Albert Belt, 35, 919 Ninth street southeast, employed in the shop of the Washington Railway and Electric company at 2411 P street northwest, was injured yesterday when he fell into a power pit at the barn. He was taken to Emergency Hospital and treated for scalp lacerations and bruises.
