DR. COOK DENIED HEARING.

House Committee Declines to Favor Probe of Pole Discovery.

The attempted revival of the Cook-Pole controversy over the discovery of the North Pole was snuffed out yesterday by the House Committee on Education, which decided unanimously to take no action on the resolution offered by Representative Smith, of Buffalo, calling for a decision by Congress.

As more than a majority of the committee were present when the action was taken, it may be regarded as final for the present session of Congress at least. The committee held its sessions behind closed doors and Dr. Cook was not present to advance his claims as a discoverer.

The Smith resolution provided simply that Congress "determine whether or not an American discovered the North Pole." It held in the preamble that the subject is one of scientific interest, that educators, historians, and map makers are asking official action and that neither the Navy Department nor the Coast and Geodetic Survey have authority for the statement that the pole was discovered by an American.

OUTLINES VAST SCOPE OF MUNITIONS MAKING

Vice President of Midvale Steel Co. Tells House Committee of Extensive Operations.

The enterprise of American manufacturers in meeting the unprecedented demand for munitions of war was reflected in the testimony of W. P. Barba, vice president of the Midvale Steel Company, before the House Naval Affairs Committee yesterday.

Mr. Barba explained that the Bethlehem Steel Company had developed the manufacture of field artillery and ammunition and had outdistanced all rivals in this respect. The Midvale Company, he said, had followed a different line and had devoted itself to the manufacture of small arms and howitzer shells.

"Within five and one-half months," Mr. Barba told the committee, "the Midvale Company had built its plant at Edgeton for the manufacture of rifles for the English army. We are working on a contract of upward of \$50,000,000 and employ there 15,000 men.

"We figured that the present war would result in the development of trench fighting requiring howitzer work and shaped our plans accordingly. There has been a great demand for high explosive howitzer shells and we have added 800 men to our Midvale plants working on these.

WARDMAN WILL BUILD BIG APARTMENT HOUSE

Seven-Story Structure Will Be Erected on Triangular Lot on Sixteenth Street.

Plans have been completed by Harry Wardman for the erection of a seven-story apartment house to cost approximately \$175,000, on the triangular lot bounded by Sixteenth street, V street and New Hampshire avenue northwest. Work will be started immediately, and will be completed about November.

The plans, which were prepared by Architect Schneider, call for fifty-one apartments ranging from one room with kitchen and bath, to six-room suites. A feature of the building will be a palatial lobby running through the first floor, with entrances on Sixteenth, New Hampshire and Hampshire avenues. The shape of the lot makes air shafts necessary. The lot is 186 feet on New Hampshire avenue, 138 feet on Sixteenth street and 194 feet on V street.

The ground was acquired by Mr. Wardman from John H. Chaney. The stamps on the deed indicate a cash consideration of \$30,000. On the first floor will be two suites laid off especially for physician's offices. The front will be finished in tapestry brick.

BURTON MAY SECURE MINNESOTA BALLOTS

Granville W. Mooney, Ohioan's Manager, Pleased at List of Delegates Named There for Cummins.

When Granville W. Mooney, who is managing Senator Burton's political interests, was shown a list of the delegates selected in Minnesota, he expressed himself in his most enthusiastic manner. He fully understood that the delegates were pledged to Senator Cummins and would, of course, respect the obligation of their first choice, that so far as the persons of the delegates were concerned it was exceedingly satisfactory, and he believed that many friends of Senator Burton would be found on this delegation in the event that he should come in the convention when their obligation to Senator Cummins was honorably discharged.

He commented particularly on the favorable indications that former Gov. Eberhart, who had openly expressed his second choice for Burton during the campaign, ran some 12,000 votes ahead of the ticket.

LANSING GETS PAPERS IN CASE OF PATRIA

Carranza's Envoy Expects Word from Mexican Ruler Regarding Protocol Covering Villa Chase.

Mr. Spring-Rice, the British Ambassador, saw Secretary Lansing on matters pertaining to British restrictions of American trade.

CEREMONY WILL MARK STEAMER'S FIRST TRIP

Majestic to Make Maiden Voyage Down the Potomac April 8—Plans Being Formulated.

Announcement was made yesterday that the steamer Majestic being built by the Potomac and Chesapeake Steamboat Company, will make her maiden trip down the Potomac April 8. The launching of the craft will be marked with ceremony, in which business men of Washington will participate.

Delegations from the Retail Merchants' Association and other trade organizations will be aboard the boat when she makes her maiden trip. Arrangements for the part the Retail Merchants' Association is to take in the launching program were discussed yesterday in a conference between Charles J. Columbus, secretary, and C. H. St. John, manager of the line.
