It is believed that the present method of having persons who mail insured packages fill out slips is too cumbersome, and under the experimental one, a person will get a receipt upon deposit of the package and after naming the amount for which the package is to be insured.

**NEW YORK PLEDGES RESOURCES TO U. S.**

Legislature Adopts Resolution Holding Militia in Readiness for International Break.

(By International News Service.)  
Albany, N. Y., April 20.—The State of New York, through its legislature, tonight pledged to President Wilson all its resources of men and material in the event of war with Germany.  
The following resolution was adopted by both houses at their final session this evening:  
"Whereas, a crisis in the relations of the United States and foreign nations was disclosed by the address of the President of the United States yesterday before the joint session of Congress, and  
"Whereas, the conditions of the relations of the nation with foreign governments may at any moment make necessary action on the part of the State in upholding the nation's honor;  
"Resolved, That the legislature pledges to the President and Congress its unqualified support in any action necessary to maintain that honor and will support

**WANTS U. S. TO CALL PEACE.**

Nevada Senator Presents Resolution Designed to End Conflict.

A plea by the United States Senate to the warring nations to cease, bring about peace by mutual concessions, and enter into an agreement for a decrease in arms, is contained in a resolution introduced yesterday by Senator Newlands, of Nevada.  
With England dominant by sea and Germany by land, he said, it was plain that no result but continued bloodshed could be hoped for.  
When war has ceased, his resolution proposed that international disputes should be adjudged by the establishment of an international court.

**VON IGEL PAPERS MUST BE RETURNED AT ONCE**

Lansing Netted Because District Attorney Sends Back Merely Photographic Copies.

Secretary of State Lansing indicated yesterday that the State Department's order for the return of the official papers of Wolfe von Igel, formerly secretary to Capt. von Papen, and now a member of the German Embassy staff, was mandatory. Far-reaching and unpleasant complications are predicted unless the order is obeyed. The report that District Attorney Marshall had sent only photographic copies of the papers to Washington nettled officials here.  
The report that the Department of Justice would ask the German Ambassador to identify these photographic copies as part of the German Embassy's property was ridiculed here. The Department of Justice, it is explained, cannot take the matter up with Count von Bernstorff in any form and the State Department has no intention of taking any other course than returning the papers to the Ambassador with apologies for having taken them.

avoid the charge of siding with the allies, he said.  
Mr. Bryan's speech was impeded somewhat by a cold, caused, he said, by having his hat cut, but he talked for forty-five minutes. He said:  
"The injuries we suffer are not intended against us. The injuries to us are incidental to the injuring of others. It is not an evidence of unfriendliness."  
Defends Henry Ford.  
As for Henry Ford's expedition, it was noble, he said.  
"I know of nothing so heartless in this country as the attempt by newspapers to ridicule such a noble purpose," he continued. "Ford was not controlled by his pocketbook. In ridiculing the expedition, the papers showed what was back of them."  
He declared an indirect influence of the expedition will be the molding of party platforms according to the principles which inspired Ford, and he touched upon preparedness by saying the "people were being lashed into changing a policy by two groups—militarists and manufacturers."

**SPEAKS ON CHINA'S PROBLEM.**

Millard Says President Yuan Holds the Whip Hand.

Inside reminiscences of the wheels within wheels which turned the ancient Manchu government out of power in China and put a republic in its stead was given to the National Press Club last night by Thomas F. Millard, editor of The China Press, of Shanghai, and author of "America and the Far Eastern Problem."  
In regard to the developments in China since the successful revolution of 1911 and the present critical state of affairs, Mr. Millard stated that President Yuan Shih Kai is the one strong man of China, and that it does not make any difference whether the government is a so-called republic or a monarchy, so long as Yuan Shih Kai continues to run it with practically autocratic powers.

**TURKS SCENT VICTORY.**

Officially Announce Expected Surrender of Kut-el-Amara.

Constantinople (via Amsterdam), April 20.—The 10,000 British troops under Gen. Townshend, besieged at Kut-el-Amara, Mesopotamia, by the Turks, are slowly being starved, according to an official communication given out today.  
The only food reaching the town is dropped by aeroplanes. Turkish officials expect at any moment to hear of the capitulation of this army.
