

EASTER PARADE OF FINERY TODAY

Partly Overcast Skies and Cool Weather Not Expected to Deter Promenaders.

Richly dressed in flowers and with music in the air, Washington this morning awakes to commemorate the resurrection of Christ from the dead. The spirit of Easter predominated even before the church bells pealed out their message to worshippers, for he was a heedless householder who had not stocked his home with flowers of the season. Awaiting the faithful in bloom-bedecked churches are elaborate programs of music, a glorification in song of the risen Savior, to be rendered by augmented choirs and by organs.

Though skies rather dull are predicted by the Weather Bureau, those individuals who emerge from the gloom of Lent in a wonderful adornment of dress will follow Connecticut avenue's precedent undeterred. The promenade along that thoroughfare on Easter Sunday is surpassed only by Fifth avenue's dress parade and the style review along Atlantic City's Boardwalk. The Bureau last night assured the doubtful that no storms were in sight, although a day partly overcast may develop, with westerly winds and cool weather. So a brilliant procession this afternoon is presaged by a recollection of last year's lengthy Easter procession, though the ground was damp and the air chilled by a preceding day's snow.

That the parade will be above the par of former promenades is predicted by those who keep in close touch with merchants and makers of women's apparel.

SECRETARY BAKER HITS ANTI-STOP WATCH BILL

Throws Down Gauntlet to Organized Labor by Defending the Plan of Timing Employees.

Secretary of War Baker threw down the gauntlet to organized labor yesterday by sending to the House a report expressing strong opposition to the Tavenner anti-stop-watch bill which was about to be reported by the House Committee on Labor.

The Secretary of War says that the bill, which has the backing of the labor union men, would be unwise and adds that "it would be a grave misfortune to the public and to the employees of the government" engaged at the Watertown Arsenal if action prejudicial to the timing system were taken. He also condemns provisions in the army appropriation bill prohibiting the timing of employees in government plants.

Secretary Baker explains that the system fixes a time limit for each piece of work and provides for the payment of a cash bonus to the workman who completes a task under the limit. "During the five years that the system has been in operation at the arsenal," he says, "neither the day wage nor the number of employees has diminished, but the amount of work done and the average earnings have increased in an important degree."

BAKER WANTS \$454,084 FOR TRAINING CAMPS

War Secretary Sends Congress Supplemental Estimate to Defray Expenses of Summer Outing.

A supplemental estimate of \$454,084 to defray the expenses of the summer military training camps for civilians was transmitted to the House yesterday from the Secretary of War. "This amount,"

said Secretary Baker, "is deemed impractically necessary for the efficient conduct of such camps during the summer." The Secretary explained that the estimate was not included with the regular army estimates for the reason that establishment of summer camps had not been decided upon at that time and that no data as to the number of men that would take the course of training was available. "Reports received from the several department commanders," added Secretary Baker, "indicate that the maximum attendance at the camps will approximate 28,500."

An estimate of \$1,996,021 for deficiency appropriations for the Navy Department was submitted to the House yesterday by Secretary Daniels. The largest item in the total is for the pay of enlisted men of the navy, \$82,953, for the year 1915. Other items are coal, \$20,057; ammunition, 1915, \$280,000.
