

EASTER SUNDAY PACKS CHURCHES

Black Skies No Bar to Crowds
in All Temples of the
City.

SPECIAL MUSIC HEARD

Worshippers at St. Patrick's Morning
Services Contribute Record Col-
lection for Education of Priests.

Despite the wintry air and overcast
skies which made Easter Sunday's
weather appear more like that of Thank-
sgiving Day, churches of the Capital were
crowded yesterday morning and last even-
ing to hear the special sermons, to
witness the Easter exercises, and to give
"Mildred" the opportunity to wear her
Easter gowns, as well as to see what
the other women wore.

Washington joined heartily with the
rest of the Christian world in its cele-
bration of the festival. Every church in
the city had special musical programs,
was banked with flowers, and was at-
tended by congregations which filled
every pew. White lilies and roses were
prominent among the floral decorations
of every religious institution in the city.
Many of the congregations had Easter
sermons at both morning and evening
services, though either one or the other
was given over almost entirely to the
choir numbers.

St. Patrick's Church Crowded.
One of the most impressive of all ser-
vices was that held at St. Patrick's Cath-
olic Church yesterday morning at 11
o'clock. No dense was the crowd there,
augmented by 300 persons from other
churches, that it was difficult to conduct
the church's professional. The announcement
that the collection would go to help edu-
cate young men for the priesthood, was
met with unusually large gifts from
those present. It was said to be close
to the record contribution at a single
service in the house of worship.

After the solemn high mass had been
celebrated by Rev. Thomas McQuinn and
an augmented choir had been heard in
an especially arranged program, Rev.
John McNamara preached upon the
meaning of Easter to the world, char-
acterizing the day as one of "gladness,
victory and hope." He explained the
music and flowers as being the outward
signs of the happiness that rules in the
forests of all right-living mankind.

Some of the churches had special
speakers for their Easter services. Prom-
inent among these men being Judge W.
P. Norris, of the Department of Justice,
who talked at Fourth Presbyterian
church last evening on "The Immortal
Hope," and Edward Collins, who spoke
at All Souls' Unitarian Church upon
"Easter Thoughts."


