

# GIRLS BEAT MEN AT RADIO WORK

Wireless Expert Lauds Fair Sex for Interest Shown in Lessons at Military Camp.

## BUT MACHINERY GETS 'EM

"Ain't in Their Line," Explains Blue Jacket—Red Cross Work Featured in Day's Address.

"They are serious, and pay much better attention than men do," said the bronze faced blue-jacket in charge of the wireless instruction at the girls' training camp at Chevy Chase, in speaking of his pupils yesterday.

"Yes," he went on, "they are trying to learn the code all right and I believe some of 'em are going to do it before they're through."

"But how about the apparatus?" suggested an inquisitive reporter.

The blue-jacket pushed back his cap. "Well, machinery ain't in their line, you see. You can explain it to them, and they stand around and listen polite enough, but they don't get it. No, machinery ain't in a woman's line. But they're in earnest all right, don't make any mistake about that."

And after the close of the first week, that seemed to be the universal opinion, they are in earnest, and there has been no waning of interest in their work.

**Red Cross Features.**

The Red Cross was the feature of yesterday's work. Miss Mable Boardman, the head of the American Red Cross, who was to have spoken in the assembly tent, was called away, but Miss Jane A. Delano, chairman of the Red Cross Nursing Service, read the paper which Miss Boardman had prepared. Col. Jefferson Kean, U. S. A., military director of the American Red Cross, spoke on "The Place of the Red Cross in Time of War," and Miss Marion L. Oliver, who is in charge of the unit at the camp, talked about the "Patriotic Response to the Red Cross and the Lay Personnel."

The Red Cross plays one of the most important parts in the training of the girls. It has charge of all instructions, except military, hats off to the patient Sergeant of Marines—and the signal work, and it takes care in its field hospital, under charge of Miss M. L. Haas, of the sick and injured. So far there have been few of these to care for, except patients suffering from sunburn and blisters and like minor ailments.


