Doherty, grand knight of Lynchburg; Thomas E. Dyson, State advocate, of Alexandria; M. E. Greene, grand knight of Alexandria; J. P. Sifer, grand knight of Portsmouth; Daniel Crimmins, past grand knight of Staunton; Thomas A. Murphy, grand knight of Richmond; and George Eakin, past grand knight, of Newport News.

Prior to the assembling of the convention, the delegates attended mass at St. Mary's Church. Rev. James Gileman, State chaplain of Roanoke, was celebrant. Rev. Luederitz, German consul in Baltimore, who on Monday was indicted on conspiracy charge because of his alleged part in getting a passport for Horst von Der Goltz, a German agent, did not appear at the Federal Building today to answer to the charge. The authorities said that if he does not appear within a reasonable time, they will issue a bench warrant for his arrest.

Denver Elects R. W. Speer Mayor.

Denver, Colo., May 9.—Denver, a city of 250,000 population, as a result of today's municipal election will return to the old mayor form of government after three years' trial of the commission form. Unofficial returns at 9 o'clock tonight show that Robert W. Speer, former mayor of the "booz" type, has been re-elected to the office of mayor by an estimated majority of between 12,000 and 14,000. It is estimated that about 62,000 votes were cast.

Pennsylvania Germans for Ford.

Philadelphia, May 9.—The name of Henry Ford, as the Presidential candidate of German sympathizers and pacifists in Pennsylvania, bobbed up in political circles today. In reliable quarters it was learned that an organized movement has already been launched in strict secrecy among German sympathizers in the State to have Ford's name placed upon the preferential primary ballots next Tuesday.

Scenario Contest Extended.

The Congressional Union contest for the best scenario of a moving picture play based on the actions of the Judiciary Committee in relation to the Susan B. Anthony amendment, which was to have ended on May 25, will be continued a week longer, according to an announcement last night by Miss Maud Younger, acting chairman of the legislative committee of the union.

Delta Tau Delta Meets Friday.

Speaker of the House Clark and Minor Leader Mann will be the guests of honor at a smoker to be given Friday night at Raucher's by Delta Tau Delta Fraternity. The meeting will be on the eve of the thirteenth anniversary of the establishment of the local chapter of the fraternity at George Washington University.

SCORES DRINKING IN ARMY.

Resolution in Methodist Conference Refers to "Unspeakable Carousals." Saratoga, N. Y., May 9.—Lively debate was caused in the Methodist general conference today over the implication in a resolution that United States soldiers are generally addicted to drunkenness.

The resolution was introduced by Herbert B. Johnson, of California, who wanted the conference to adopt a memorial to Congress asking a ban on the export of liquors to the Hawaiian Islands. In the preamble was the assertion that such action was necessary because of an "increasing number of American soldiers, among whom unspeakable carousals on account of the use of intoxicants have taken place." He referred, he said, to an occurrence that followed the recent visit of troops to the islands.

INTERMYER MAY GET BRANDEIS NOMINATION

Senate Hears Rumor That Present Nominee Will Be Withdrawn. Brandeis Will Not Accept.

Two interesting reports circulated through the Senate yesterday and gave a new turn of interest to the Brandeis case. One was that the name of Louis D. Brandeis, nominated for Supreme Court justice, would be withdrawn and the name of Samuel Untermyer be substituted. It was even said that Mr. Untermyer was offered the nomination for the bench before it was conferred on Mr. Brandeis and that the New Yorker declined.

THREE DELEGATIONS LIKELY

Probably All Local G. O. P. Factions Will Go to Chicago. There is a strong chance that when the District's charter draws up at Chicago on June 7, the members of all three tickets for delegates and alternates will alight, instead of those of but one.

Robert I. Miller, head of the Miller-Chase faction, asserted last evening that he wants the election board to disregard the votes, which were counted on Monday night, and allow the national convention to seat any ticket it desires after a hearing is granted all three by the credentials committee.

That he will file a number of affidavits charging fraud was the statement of Mr. Miller, who further claims that no certificate can be given the Hoan-Williston ticket until after the stiffest sort of a fight. Mr. Miller is now getting these affidavits in shape, he asserted.

R. H. Hamilton to Lecture.

Ralph H. Hamilton, of Catholic University, will lecture in Baltimore tomorrow at the College of Notre Dame and the Academy of The Visitation. "From the Potomac to the Pacific" and "Our National Parks" will be the subjects.

INQUIRES ABOUT CYMRIC SINKING

U. S. Hardly Will Raise Issue Over Cargo Steamship Evidently Torpedoed.

IN ADMIRALTY SERVICE

State Officials Seeking Facts Concerning Two Other Similar Cases Which Are Reported.

The State Department has begun an investigation of the sinking of the White Star liner Cymric, which occurred while the latest note of the United States was on its way to Berlin.

Consul Wesley Frost, at Queenstown, reported that the Cymric was torpedoed, evidently without warning. After this report was received, Consul General Skinner cabled a Lloyd's report giving the names of three other vessels torpedoed within the last few days.

The State Department immediately made inquiries through consular sources to determine the facts in all these cases. State Department officials said the fact that the Cymric was in admiralty service did not justify unwarranted submarine attack unless it were shown the Cymric actually had been requisitioned by the British admiralty. The vessel could be chartered by the admiralty and used for the transportation of war supplies without becoming a part of the British naval forces, in the State Department's view.

The department is proceeding on the assumption that the Cymric was a merchant vessel, since it was permitted to clear as a merchantman from New York on its present trip.

The fact that no Americans were aboard the Cymric, that she did not carry passengers, and that she was heavily laden with war material for the allies made it appear unlikely that United States will raise an issue over the incident.

10,000 TO SEE CONVENTION.

Thousands Ready to Pay \$50 to Attend G. O. P. Gathering.

Chicago, May 9.—Plans for the distribution of admission tickets to the Republican national convention, which is to be held here June 7, were completed today by Fred W. Upham, chairman of the citizens' committee, which brought the convention to Chicago.

There will be between 9,000 and 10,000 tickets given out. The entire supply of tickets has been exhausted or promised, Mr. Upham said today. Expecting evidently to see some riotous history-making scenes, thousands of Chicagoans and Middle Westerners are literally buying the Republican National Committee under an avalanche of requests for convention tickets at \$50 each.


