One way to make a small room larger is to have the walls knocked out, one, some or all of them. Another way is to rearrange the furnishings.

The first thing is to simplify the furnishings of the room. Remember that a monotonous color scheme helps to do this, and to create an appearance of space.

Now you have a good beginning. Depend on the smaller furnishings for the bright touch of color that give character to the room.

Have only a few pictures and hang these carefully. A small wall, broken with window and door frames and cluttered with pictures, appears smaller.

Now comes the arrangement of the furniture. If there is an upright piano, space can often be saved by placing it well out from the wall, with the back toward the room.

Another economical space arrangement is this: A couch can be arranged with a tier of book shelves at one end of it. The back of the shelves can be covered with denim, and on this a picture or two of interest in color may be hung.

Leave a space in the center of the room. Don't put a center table there. Let the table for books and magazines and reading lamp be well toward one side of the room.

The lampshade, flowers, books and a few small and interesting ornaments should give the color needed in a room so furnished.

In these homely words Lord Roberts, the distinguished British military hero, mentions one of the happiest events of his life, his autobiography. He had returned to his home in Ireland after a long period of service in India, having first stopped off at London for the very necessary re-equipment of his military wardrobe.

They were married fifty-seven years ago today in the parish church of Waterford, Ireland, and after a brief wedding tour in Scotland, they were forced by an unexpected order to return to India to start out on the voyage over the Red Sea.

The courage of the plucky young bride must have been severely tested by the heat at this time of year that more than once the captain ordered the boat to turn around and steam against the breeze, and to revive the fainting and suffocating passengers. Once, in the dead of night, they passed the wreck of a ship that had struck a coral reef not long before, and the crew and officers went to work to restore the mails and personal property aboard. Nora must have thought longingly of the verdant shores of India.

Life in India for the young bride was not any too comfortable. For a time she lived in a tent—of enormous proportions, to be sure, but still exposed to the intense heat.
