

BRYAN MAY BACK FOLK CANDIDACY

Former Missouri Governor Being Talked About for Vice Presidency.

MARSHALL WANTS PLACE

Wilson Agrees to Present Understudy, but Folk Boom May Stir Up Hornet's Nest.

Just as the Democratic leaders were sitting back on their haunches content with the prospect that the party convention at St. Louis would be staged with no untoward incident to mar the harmony front that the administration would have presented to the country, up bids a vice-presidential boom that is said to have been started by the administration. Bryan, the O. K. of William Jennings Bryan, if whispers that are heard in Washington are correct, Mr. Bryan, who is spoiling for a fight despite his talk about peace, will go to St. Louis with a demand that the Bryan following in the Democratic party be given representation on the ticket this year in the person of Joseph W. Folk, of Missouri. The Folk boom was born in private, but Bryan leaders declare it will soon be proclaimed publicly with all due form and ceremony.

Recently, for the sake of harmony, it was agreed that Vice President Marshall should be given another term. The administration has pressed the rollers for him. Newton D. Baker, Secretary of War, was the administration choice. Friends of Marshall learned about this, and declared there would be trouble if Mr. Marshall were thrown into the discard. Sadly, the administration consented to the renomination of Mr. Marshall.

If Mr. Folk should persist in his candidacy, and Mr. Bryan should go to the limit for him, there would doubtless be staged at St. Louis one of those rare, old rough and tumble for which Democratic conventions are famous.






