CLIMB LADDERS TO MAKE RAID

Throng Sees Spectacular Descent on Alleged Gambling House by Police.

The police staged an exciting raid on an alleged gambling house at 1612 Fourteenth street northwest, shortly after 1 o'clock this morning. Hundreds of persons looked on until two police patrol wagons, containing twenty-five prisoners, rolled away.

Maj. Pullman, chief of police, regarded the raid of such importance that he left his bed and hurried to police headquarters, where he took active charge of the examination of the prisoners. "We got the biggest gamblers in town," said Maj. Pullman.

The raid was carried out swiftly. Two auto patrols halted in front of the building and a long ladder, borrowed by the police from the fire department, was placed against a second story window.

Police Climb Ladder.

Sergt. J. W. Pearson and Policemen S. S. Coggins, of the Eighth precinct, quickly mounted the ladder and entered the window. In less than ten minutes, ten other policemen had taken stations at points in front and rear of the building at which it was believed the alleged gamblers would try to escape.

The police say they found dice and money in the room in which they allege the gambling was in progress. Julian Reid, also known as "Buddy" Reid, was arrested on a charge of setting up a gaming table. A well known physician found in the house declared he was there in answer to an emergency call to attend a man who had been kicked.

The prisoners taken with Reid will be used as witnesses, the police assert. Maj. Pullman declared the police have been trying for weeks to break up the alleged gambling. He said the promoters have moved from one precinct to another, every few days to escape detection.

Jumps From Window.

As Sergeant Pearson and Policeman Coggins climbed from the ladder, the front window one of the alleged gamblers made a desperate effort to escape by jumping from a rear window. He fled, but later was arrested, according to a telephone call received at headquarters from an outlying precinct.

The rooms raided are over a store occupied by an auto company. The police declare the rooms were used almost solely for the alleged gambling.

TO HONOR HOGAN TICKET.

G. O. P. Convention Will Seat Local Delegates.

Frank J. Hogan and Dr. E. H. Williston will be seated during the preliminary meeting of the Republican national convention in Chicago next week. They have received from Secretary Reynolds, of the national committee, certificates to this effect. Robert I. Miller and W. Calvin Chase will be present to make a fight for the permanent seats before the credentials committee, as will be Aaron Bradshaw and Dr. Charles Marshall.

Before he issued this certificate, Secretary Reynolds revised the claims of all three aides. The Hogan-Williston men sent the certificate issued to them by two members of the returning board, showing that they had beat both the other tickets in the recent primaries by a plurality of something like 5 to 1.

MENACE IS SEEN IN EARLY PEACE

Gardner Introduces Resolution to Prevent Premature End of War.

In the midst of the discussion of the possibilities of peace which is engaging the attention of many members of Congress, a belligerent note was sounded yesterday by Representative Gardner, of Massachusetts, who introduced a resolution designed, as he said, to prevent the United States from becoming involved in any German plan for the premature ending of the war. The resolution reads: "Whereas, in the opinion of the vast majority of the people of the United States, the deplorable European war was wantonly and madly precipitated by the autocracies which govern Germany and Austria, and

"Whereas, France, the British Empire, Russia, Japan, Belgium, Serbia, Italy and Portugal have entered into an alliance for the preservation of civilization and the punishment of international faithlessness,

"Resolved, that the Congress of the United States heartily congratulates France and her allies on the success which is so certain the near future to crown their superb efforts, and

"Resolved further, that the Congress of the United States expresses its heartfelt admiration of the 200,000 Irishmen who are now heroically serving the cause of their country and of civilization in the trenches in France and Belgium, and

"STOLE SOLES" IS CHARGE.

Old Soldier Accused of Selling Leather to Fellow-Craftsmen.

Arrested on a charge of "stealing soles," Isadore Cohen was taken to the First precinct yesterday by Central Office Detectives Kelly and Burlingame from Soldiers' Home.

Seventy-eight years old and a Russian, in his capacity of shoemaker at the home, Cohen envied the lofty heights of Billy Sunday's success. Billy, he had heard, went out and gathered in souls by the armful. Isadore gathered soles by the bagful. It is charged that Cohen had been cutting out half-soles, bringing them to the city and selling them to his fellow-craftsmen.

Ossining, N. Y., May 27.—John Anbut, the former lawyer, convicted of attempting to bribe Harry Thaw's way out of Matteawan Asylum, is one of several notable paroled today by the State board of parole.
