

ACCIDENT DELAYS McADOO AUTO TRIP

Treasury Secretary Attaches No Blame for Broken Spring to His Opal, However.

They were not there for the pleasure of the thing, but from necessity, having met with a mishap on the way from Washington to Philadelphia, where Mr. McAdoo had planned to take his daughter by surprise.

The car was a smart little gray roadster, and everything was going along beautifully. Mr. McAdoo said, until a point about eleven miles from Baltimore was reached, when one of the rear springs broke.

McAdoo at Wheel. "We left home about 8:30," Mr. McAdoo continued, "and had expected to be well on the way to Philadelphia by this time. Here it is 12 o'clock already. Fortunately, the accident was not serious enough to stop our progress. I was driving myself and brought the car in at a low rate of speed. We are going to proceed and shall probably take lunch at Belair."

"Both Mrs. McAdoo and I have a great affection for this particular car, for we used it on our honeymoon. This is the very first time anything has happened to it."


